## TOO MUCH WASTE IN MEMORIALS

Germany Fearful Lest She Spend Too Much on Statues.

Berlin, March 29.—Mindful of the experiences following the Franco-Prussian war in 1870-1871, the Royal Academy of Arts and the Royal Academy of Agriculture have jointly issued a warning to Germany at large, cautioning against extravagant memorials for the fallen, and urging that the greatest conservatism be used in fittingly honoring the dead.

The war of 1870 says the appeal, was followed by a veritable flood of statues and monuments to William I., and by countless Germanias, hardly any of which have withstood the test of art or time. The members of the two academies profess to see the danger of a repetition of this lack of taste in connection with the present war. The danger is impending, they believe, that every German city, big and little will try to outdo every other city in immortalizing its fallen sons, whereas it is highly desirable that efforts in this direction be combined rather than working in competition. The academy members suggest rather one national memorial in solemn form, shall express gratitude to God and patriotic inspiration. Toward such an end, they declare, the art of the sculptor in its highest form would be called into requisition to honor suitably in stone and metal all those men who by word and deed have helped to make Germany unbeatable.

The first commencement exercises of the new Cobourg Hospital were held in the opera house. Dr. Helen MacMurchey, of Toronto, gave an address.

## CHARGES AGAINST COL. J. W. ALLISON

Liberal Member Claims He Got Commission on Fuse Orders.

HON. MR. WHITE

MAKES REPLY

Declares He Has More to Say Upon Adjournment of Debate.

Ottawa, March 29.—A determined effort on the part of the Opposition to underpin their demand for an investigation of Imperial shell purchases in Canada, marked the final stage of the debate on Sir Wilfrid Laurier's resolution. This effort was put forward by Mr. George W. Kye, of Richmond, N.S., team mate of F. B. Carvell, in prosecuting enquiries before the Public Accounts Committee. Mr. Kye set himself to accomplish two things, first to restore the battered case presented to the House some weeks ago by Mr. Carvell and later badly damaged by the speech of the Solicitor-General, and secondly, to present new material with regard to alleged irregularities in the transactions of Col. J. Wesley Allison. As a means of salvaging the Carvell case Mr. Kye presented a statement secured by Mr. Carvell from the Imperial Munitions Board with respect to Western shell orders. With respect to these orders there had been a wide gulf between the statements of Mr. Carvell and Hon. Arthur Meighen as to dates and deliveries. The statement obtained by Mr. Carvell and presented by Mr. Kye agreed with the statement made to the House by the Solicitor-General. Mr. Kye, however, Richmond Liberal spoke till after eleven o'clock, having begun shortly after five, and did not reach the gravamen of his speech until late. He then read to the House a series of declarations purporting to show that Col. Allison had taken very large shell fuse orders to the United States, had placed them with mushroom companies, newly organized for the purpose and possessing no plants; that heavy advance payments were made to these companies; that part of the prices received, very large sums of money, were divided as commissions among certain gentlemen named; that Col. Allison was a financial beneficiary from the transactions, and that statements to the contrary before the Davidson Commission were therefore false.

Mr. Kye spoke to an unusually full House, and was given generous support from his own side, but his speech was frequently interrupted by the noise occasioned by his repeated refusal to allow corrections of his statements by the Solicitor-General.

WHY NOT LA CHARGE? Sir Thomas White, who followed the member for Richmond, pointed out that Mr. Kye had attempted to support fundamentally false statements by adding to them. The Finance Minister showed that statement after statement made by Mr. Carvell and shown by the Solicitor-General to have been incorrect, had not been referred to by Mr. Kye at all. As to the new allegations, he asked why the member for Richmond did not lay his complaint before the Department of Justice, and have the man charged extradited. The Department would do its duty.

Sir Thomas emphasized the fact that in all that had been said by Opposition members, no charge of fraud, dishonesty or corruption had been made against members of the shell committee. He questioned whether any good purpose would be served by investigating the work of a defunct committee, and pointed out that no real investigation could take place without the bringing of witnesses from the War Office and without the consent of the Imperial Government. As to the prices paid and the orders placed by the Shell Committee the Dominion Government had no authority and therefore no responsibility. Dealing with the fuse contract Sir Thomas explained that large initial payments were not unusual, but as a rule guarantees were taken. He would investigate as to whether this had been done in the case under discussion. Referring to a statement by Mr. Kye, that Sir Sam Hughes had signed an endorsement of the contracts, Sir Thomas explained that on behalf of the Imperial and not of the Canadian Government.

At 12.30 the Finance Minister adjourned the debate, stating that he had a good deal more to say and some things to look into. Other speakers to-day were Mr. F. P. Pardee, of West Lambton and Mr. W. A. Boyce, of South Simcoe.

### Socialist on Council.

Berlin, March 29.—It appears that one effect of the war will be to break the taboo against Socialists in executive positions of city governments. Just now the city of Charlottenburg has installed a Socialist as an unpaid member of the Council, or executive authority of the city. Frankfurt-on-the-Main has gone still further by electing Dr. Lindemann, of Stuttgart, a former member of the Reichstag, to a paid position on its governing board as a specialist in municipal government.
