BRITAIN THANKS EMPIRE FORCES

Resolution Moved in House of Commons by Premier Lloyd George

GOOD WORK OF NAVY Fleet Has Ensured Transportation of Thirteen Million Men 3,000,000 IN FRANCE

London, Oct. 29.—Parliament today adopted a resolution presented by Premier Lloyd George, expressing the thanks of the Parliament to the navy and the army, including the overseas troops and the mercantile marine, for their services in the war, and to the women in the medical and other auxiliary services, and further expressing sympathy to the relatives and friends of those who have given their lives for their country.

The only interruption Premier Lloyd George suffered when moving his resolution came when he reached the paragraph referring to the services of the Dominions and colonies. "England," said the Premier, parenthetically, "has contributed 75 per cent of the fighting forces. Members near him suggested that Great Britain. Another asked, What about Scotland?"

"I am coming to Scotland immediately," answered the Premier, "I want to say a word about England first for the simple reason that our foes have been circulating again the same old calumny that England fought her battles with the help of others. There never was a time when it was less true. Scotland has always done its share. Ireland has made a distinguished contribution, and has Wales. The Dominions have sent between seven and eight hundred thousand men, five times the number of our original expeditionary force. And what a contribution they have made—have they not sent their own best men, the best of their own race, the best of their own blood?"

The Premier proceeded: "I speak equally warmly but as briefly of what Australia, South Africa, the Crown colonies, have done. The greater part of the speech was occupied with speaking of the navy and army as a whole. Twice he referred to the anxiety of the past few years, which has militated against his preparation of an adequate speech.

What the Navy Has Done. Premier Lloyd George, in moving the resolution, said that even if he had leisure in these terrible times, especially the anxiety of the last two or three days, he could not do justice to this great theme. The deeds mentioned in the resolution were known to and had won the admiration of every subject of the King.

The British navy was like one of those internal organs essential to life, of which we are unconscious until something goes wrong. In this respect, said the Premier, the navy had been the anchor of the allied cause. If it lost its hold the hopes of the alliance would be shattered.

The Premier told how the navy had guaranteed supplies to the army abroad and material which it had enabled the allies to get from abroad, adding: "Achievement of Navy. "But for the navy, disaster would have fallen upon the allied cause. Prussia would be mistress of Europe and through Europe of the world. Despite hidden foes, despite illegitimate naval warfare, despite black piracy, the navy has preserved the highways of the sea for Britain and her allies. Since the beginning of the war, the navy has ensured the safe transportation to the British and allied armies of the thirteen million men, twenty million horses, twenty-five million tons of explosives and supplies, and fifty-one million tons of coal and oil. The losses of men out of the whole thirteen million were only 3,500 of which only 2,700 were lost through the action of the enemy. Altogether, 130,000,000 tons have been transported by British ships.

WOULD PUT CANADA ON WHEELS M.H.C. Vocational Advisers Find Craze for Motor Driving Among Men

Ask ninety per cent. of the men who return to Canada from the front who bolstered their history and hopes on their former occupation, what they would like to do, and they'll ask for a course in motor mechanics. Tommy's fed upon walking. He has trumped all over France and England and he's done with "hoofing it," he wants to ride. The mechanical part he knows little about, but the idea of sitting in a closed Canada will ever have for motor drivers or menders. The interviewers of the Military Hospitals Commission who take a man's vocational history and hopes on his return to Canada, find that the demand for motor mechanics courses is far in advance of the need. Canada will ever have for motor drivers or menders. It looks to the man who works eight and ten hours a day at shaping veterans' future courses, that trade at the vocational training center in the M.H.C., but by those who would be a chauffeur.
