boats has lately resulted in some very quick trips from the states to Dawson. Mrs. Walker Gilmer, for instance, is reported to have made the trip from Seattle to Dawson in eight days, while a man is said to have covered the distance from Skaguay in forty-eight hours. The latter report is not considered reliable, but one is incited to consider the importance of a question which it opens, for Dawson can only be benefitted by anything that will tend to reduce the traveling time between this place and the outside world.

While considering this subject, it occurred to the pencil pusher to make a calculation of the time it would require to make a trip in a la Jules Verne-that is, with close connections pre-supposed-and he was a bit surprised to find that it amounted to but 125 hours 20 minntes. This won't seem like a very long time to the reader, and for fear he may feel inclined to doubt its credibility it is figured out for him as follows:

The best time ever made from Seattle to Skaguay was three days, or seventytwo hours. The distance from Skaguay to Bennett is not much, but the road must be traveled slowly and caref lly, and five hours is considered a reasonable allowance to make it. From Bennett to White Horse is a twelve-hour ride, and the current will shoot the traveler through the rapids in about twenty minutes. Taking a fast traveling river boat there, he can cover the distance to Dawson in thirty-six hours, for it has been done—and there is the grand total of 125 hours and 20 minutes
