OTTAWA, Nov. 20.—The prosecution in the McGregor-Connelly case concluded its testimony on Saturday, when John Gallagher was recalled to show that he had not put in a tender for the proceeds, neither had he put up any deposit.

Black, on behalf of the plaintiff, Nicholas Connelly, argued briefly that no set of Nicholas Connelly in the charge was shown to have taken place in Ontario within the jurisdiction of the court. He contended that no case of conspiracy had been made out as yet against the defendant.

Mr. Aylesworth contended that the second half of the memorandum referring to the Quebec Harbor Commission was out of the jurisdiction and gave no evidence of agreement or conspiracy to defraud between Thomas and Nicholas.
