## FAST MAIL RAILWAY.

COMPANY FORMED IN LONDON TO BUY A CHARTER.

The New British Columbia Loan—A Steamer Launched For the Canadian Pacific Railway.

London, Nov. 19.—The prospectus is expected to-morrow of the new Canadian company, recently registered here, with a capital of £100,000, all ordinary stock, in order to acquire from Charles Carpenter of Gaspé the charter for the Atlantic, Quebec and Western Railway. The object is to build a railway from Gaspé to a point north of Canapish, where a junction will be effected with the Intercolonial. Preliminary notices in the press tell of the advantages of such a railway as a fast mail route, and dwell upon the difficulties of St. Lawrence navigation.

The new British Columbia 3 per cent. loan of £271,000 issued at 92 is believed to be unsuccessful. The stock is now purchasable at a small discount, whereas new Natal 3 per cent. is dealt in at one and one-half premium. It is feared the over borrowing of the colonies will spoil the British markets again, just when they are recovering from the last long spell of over borrowing.

The new Canadian Pacific Railway Company's steamer for the Vancouver-Victoria service was launched on the Clyde to-day. Mrs. Archer Baker, wife of the Canadian Pacific Company's European Manager, performing the ceremony.

## WAZIRIS FOUGHT STUBBORNLY.

British Indian Frontier Force Sharp-ly Engaged.

London, Nov. 19.—The punitive expedition against the Kabul Khel Waziris, whose country lies on the Indian frontier, near Bannu, and whose strength in fighting men is placed at about 3,000, has already led to far more severe fighting than was anticipated. The British force employed consists of four columns of Indian troops, each 700 to 800 strong, and started out on Sunday and Monday. It was thought that five or six days would suffice to bring the operations to a successful close, and that there would be no fighting of a serious nature.

To-day, however, news arrives that the fourth column is being obstinately opposed, and that the Colonel in command of it has been wounded, and has asked for reinforcements. The morning papers think that the Colonel alone is such an engagement, and it is surmised that the full extent of the British casualties has yet to be made known. The demand for strong reinforcements would seem to point to the probability of the force being surrounded or entrapped in some way by the enemy.

## A WORTHY OFFICIAL.

Mr. Begue of Dundas Succeeds Mr. Ghent.

Toronto, Nov. 19.—At a meeting of the Provincial Cabinet yesterday the appointment was made of Mr. T. H. A. Begue, K.C., Dundas, to the position of Deputy Clerk of the Crown, Clerk of the County Court and Registrar of Surrogate, in succession to the late S. H. Ghent.

The appointment was also made of Judge Hardy as Local Master of the High Court for the County of Brant, in place of the late Judge Jones, who, though retired, filled that position for some time past.

## TELEGRAPH BREVITIES.

Andrew Carnegie is ill.

Winnipeg City Council is establishing free skating rinks.

Heavy shipments of pig iron are being made from Britain to the United States.

A libel suit against Mr. Labouchere, editor of London Truth, resulted in a verdict in his favor.

Mr. Shorretti has been appointed Apostolic Delegate to Canada in succession to Mr. Falconio.

The Anchor Line warehouses at Glasgow were burned down, and one man killed and several injured.

Filipinos on the Isla of Leyte defeated a detachment of constabulary, killing three and wounding eight.

Bills granting the Yerkes franchises for 100 miles of "tube" railways in London have been assented to.

Mr. Alfred Domett, a Hamilton boy, has been appointed manager of the New York Car Wheel Works at Buffalo.

The detachment of Northwest Mounted Police which accompanied the Doukhobors to their villages has returned to Regina.

Grand Trunk and C. P. R. officials talk of advancing freight rates, owing to the increased cost of operating the railways.

Signor Piscelli of Italy, inventor of the electric post, will conduct experiments in England at the request of the Postmaster-General.

The official report of the volcanic eruption on the Island of St. Vincent shows that Georgetown, the capital, may have to be abandoned permanently.

H. G. Johnson, convicted of conspiracy to defraud the C. P. R., refused to testify against Conductor Patrick Carlin at Montreal, and was committed for contempt of court.

The Canadian Northern Railway Company have entered into an agreement with the Great Northern Telegraph Company to transport all commercial business for the G. N. W. Company in Manitoba.

Mr. John Mudie, K.C., of Kingston, having issued a pamphlet criticizing the referendum act, Mr. W. P. Ferguson of Chicago challenged his statements, and a public debate has been arranged between the two at Kingston.

Rev. Edward A. Wicher, M.A., B.D., of Claude, has announced to his congregation his intention of resigning his charge in order to accept a call to the pastorate of the Union Protestant Church of Kobe, in Japan.

## MORMON OBJECTED TO.

VIGOROUS CAMPAIGN AGAINST APOSTLE SMOOT.

His Candidacy For the Senate Will be Fought to the Last by His Opponents.

Salt Lake City, Nov. 19.—The Ministerial Alliance of Salt Lake City is preparing for a vigorous fight against the election of Apostle Reed Smoot to the United States Senate, and, failing in this, to carry the fight against him into Congress. A plan for organized efforts on this line, it is said, has already been outlined, and will be taken up at the next meeting of the alliance. The general idea is to make a fight similar to that waged against Brigham H. Roberts in the House. Not only will the matter be brought before the non-Mormons of the State, but if the fight is unsuccessful in the Legislature then an attempt will be made to make Mr. Smoot's election a national issue, and a petition will be drafted to Congress asking that Mr. Smoot, as a high official of the Mormon Church, be refused a seat in the Senate.

ST. CATHARINES. Assaulted by an Unknown Man—Dental Office Robbed.

St. Catharines, Nov. 19.—While Miss Bella Kottmeir was returning from school on Lake avenue last night an unknown man attacked her. The spot is a lonely one, within 100 yards of her home. Her screams brought her father to the rescue and the man escaped to Gardiner's bush. Officers went to the scene, but have failed so far to catch him.

Dr. Killmer, who has been away on a shooting trip, returned to find his dental parlors robbed of a number of valuable instruments. The place was thoroughly ransacked, and everything of value in sight taken.

## Mrs. Molinieux Seeks Divorce.

St. Catharines, S.D., Nov. 18.—Mrs. R. B. Molinieux, whose husband was recently acquitted at New York on a murder charge, yesterday gave out in her own handwriting the following statement:—"It is true I am at St. Catharines for the purpose of instituting divorce proceedings. I have no plans except that I shall be a resident here for the next six months."

## THE MARKET REPORTS.

Advance in Corn and Wheat—Live Stock Trade More Active.

Tuesday Evening, Nov. 18.

Toronto St. Lawrence Market.

The rain interfered with the transaction of business on the street market here to-day. The receipts of produce being very light. The receipts of grain were only 400 bushels, and included the following:—Wheat, 100 bushels; barley, 100 bushels; higher at 47c to 50c. No hay or straw was received. The receipts of live stock were 1,500 head; dressed hogs were quoted 25c higher at 75 to 76c.

## Toronto Live Stock.

The day's business at the Toronto Cattle Market was satisfactory to buyers and sellers, and a good trade prevailed. The market was active, but the demand was not very strong. Everything was sold. Prices were steady to firm. The closing quotations of last week were:—Cattle, 10c; sheep, 10c; hogs, 10c. The total run was 50 cars, including 1,500 head of cattle, 1,500 head of sheep, and 1,500 head of hogs.
