

COMPANY FORMED IN LONDON TO BUY A CHARTER.

The New British Columbia Loan-A Steamer Launched For the Canadian Pacific Railway.

London, Nov. 19 .- The prospectus is expected to-morrow of the new Canadian company, recently registered here, with a capital of £100,000, all ordinary stock, in order to acquire from Charles Carpenter of Gaspe the charter for the Atlantic, Quebec & Western Railway. The object is to build a railway from Gaspe to a point north of Cansapscal, where a junction will be effected with the Intercolonial. Preliminary notices in the press tell of the advantages of such a railway as a fast mail route, and dwell upon the difficulties of St. Law-

rence navigation.

WAZIRIS FOUGHT STUBBORNLY. British Indian Frontier Force Sharply Engaged.

London, Nov. 19 .- The punitive against the Kabul Khel Waziris, whose country lies on the Indian frontier, near Bannu, and whose strength in fighting men is placed at about 3,000, has already led to far more severe fighting than was anticipat-ed. The British force employed consists of four columns of Indian troops, each 700 to 800 strong, and started out on Sunday and Monday. It was thought that five or six days would suffice to bring the operations to a successful close, and that there would be no fight-

ing of a serious nature. To-day, however, news arrives that the fourth column is being obstinately opposed, and that the Colonel in comnand of it has been wounded, and has asked for reinforcements. The morning papers think that the Colonel alone is note all who are likely to be wounded in uch an engagement, and it is surmised that the full extent of the British casualties has yet to be made known. The demand for strong reinforcements would seem to point to the probability of the force having been surrounded or entrapned in some way by the enemy.

The day's business at the Toronto Cattle Market was satisfactory to buyers and selfers and a good tone prevailed. The onactings were heavy, but the demand was active and everything was sold. Prices were steady to firm, and there was little change from the closing quotations of last were at the total run was 59 cars, including 1,602 cattle, 1,812 sheep and lambs, 27 calves and 893 hogs.

Export Cattle—There was a good inquiry for the choice lots and the movement was rather lively. The o'd country markets show little improvement, but the exigencies of space compel buyers to take what they can get in order to make up their shipments. Prices are firmer. William Murby bought a load of steets, which he considered the best of any cattle offered on this market for many weeks past. They weighed 1,434 lbs each and cost \$5.45 per cwt. This was an exceptional transaction, but it proves that glit-edged stock will bring high prices on this market. The prevailing quotation for the run of the market is \$4.65 to \$5.15, and few of the day's offerings would bring the latter figure. Medium grades, including mixed loads and light weigats; are quoted higher at \$4.25 to \$4.65.

Butchers' Cattle—There was a good demand for choice weights for the best local trade, but the supply was not heavy. Prices were well maintained, with no change in quotations. Offerings of medium to good cattle were heavy, and the market was active, without showing any particular strength. Common an: rough grades were slow, but everything was sold.

Feeders and Stockers—The supply was large and the demand was fair. Some holders asked high prices, but these were obtained in only a few instances. Quotations are unchanged.

Milch Cows—Good milkers were wanted and they sold up to 10 each. Few choice ones were to be had.
