West Virginia Suffers From an Awful Flood That may Equal, if Does Not Exced. That of Johnstown Twelve Years Ago.

A series of cloudbursts swelled the ed. Impos waters of Elkhorn Creek, in West Virginia, Saturday, which rose to an unprecedented height, rushing down between two mountain ranges, carry-Secure yourself against loss by fire or lightning. Roanoke, Va., June 23.-Passengers on a train from the west report that about 300 people were drowned yesterday evening along the Elkhorn divi-sion of the Norfolk & Western Railroad, and that miles of track and bridges were washed out . The passengers on the train were transferred to-day by ropes from the train to the mountain side near Vivian, W. Va.
