The Board of Works Needs to get a Hustle on, Says N. H. Stevens.

It Would be an Improvement on the Present, However, if They Simply did nothing-No City Engineer.

"Last year the board of works filled up Kent street and Dover street with earth," said N. H. Stevens, president of the Kent Milling Company. "Yesterday we scraped the earth off the streets and are filling in with cinders. If the board of works will only stay away from us, we will have good streets down in the valley. All we ask streets down in the valley. All we ask ask from the city is permission to pay our taxes, and this we always do.. When Mr. Campbell and I were in partnership we were granted remission of taxes for ten years. At the end of eight years, I bought Mr. Campbell's, interest, and, from that time the Kent Mills have paid taxes. I don't believe in remission of taxes and I wouldn't accept what I didn't believe in, although I could have had two years remission of taxes without aking for it. The only remuneration the Kent Mills ever received for their refusal to accept remission of taxes was the taking away of the electric light that stood at the corner of Kent and Thames streets. In winter, when and Thames streets. In winter, when it gets dark early, there is no place in the city where a light is more needed. I have asked the city to give us back our light, but they have not done so. However, we won't complain. We have put over 300 loads of cinders on the streets of the valley, and made them what they are. We will put a light of our own up one of these days if the city will only let us alone."
