CHARGE MAY BE MORE SERIOUS

Condition of Monck, Victim of Yesterday's Assault, Continues Critical.

His Assaultant Confined in Castle Mercer—Bail Has Been Refused.

Clarence Tickner, the young man who assaulted William Monck at Drader's mill yesterday afternoon, was arrested yesterday at five o'clock by Chief Constable Major Coogan and is now confined in the cells at Castle Mercer.

Tickner was arrested on the charge of assault with intent to do grievous bodily harm, but the authorities are at present waiting to see if Monck will recover from the assault. If he does not, Tickner will come up on a far more serious charge.

Rumors were in circulation in the streets this morning to the effect that Monck was dead. These, however, are untrue, although the unfortunate victim of the assault is in a very precarious condition and but slight hopes are entertained for his recovery.

At 2.30 this afternoon Dr. Tye had visited his patient and reported that he was no better and was in a very bad shape.

An attempt has been made to procure bail for Tickner, but this will not be granted until Dr. Tye makes a favorable report on Monck's condition.

TRAMP'S JUMP

It Landed him Finally in the Public General Hospital—Genuine Knight of Road.

A man named Murphy, residence everywhere, profession tramp, was brought into Chatham yesterday morning on Conductor Pierce's train from Wallaceburg, suffering from a severely broken leg.

Murphy has been meeting with hard luck lately and his broken leg is the result of an unfortunate jump from a Lake Erie freight in the glass town. Murphy attempted to steal a ride between the bumpers from Wallaceburg to Sarnia. He got on all right at Wallaceburg station and the wiley tramp was just commencing to enjoy a pleasant ride when the train stopped at the pumping house station. Now Murphy had given no orders to the conductor to stop between stations and he was impatient to reach the end of his journey, he thought he would quietly drop off, investigate the matter and find out the cause of the delay. His intentions were good but alas when he jumped off he landed in the wrong place and his leg went down in a deep hole. He was found by the trainmen and was taken back to Wallaceburg. He is now in the General Hospital with prospects of remaining there for some time.

Murphy is a tall, healthy, well built man weighing about 180 pounds and has followed the life on the rail for some time.

HANDSOME BLOCK

The present Northway building is about to be transformed into one of the finest pieces of architectural beauty in the city.

This building was purchased some time ago, by A. I. McCall & Co., the Northway Co., having decided to move into the new store in the McKeeough block. The contract for rebuilding the old store for Mr. McCall has been given to Robertson & McKim, who will commence work as soon as the Northway people move out.

A. I. McCall will occupy the ground floor which will be divided into two departments, one for drugs, and the other for optical work. These departments will be kept separate. He will also put in a large soda-water fountain, for the summer trade. The whole store will be fitted up with new quarter cut oak fittings and silent salesmen which are now being made by the S. Hadley Co. There will also be two offices on the ground floor at the back, opening off 5th street.

One of these will be occupied by Banker Merritt, and the other by S. B. Arnold, barrister. The door opening to the drug store will be situated on the corner. A stairway will be put in where the present door is on King street, and will lead to the second and third stories.

The second floor will be newly fitted up with offices for Dr. A. W. Thornton, dentist, Dr. Charles Bell and a studio for Misses Webster and Pratt. The third floor will be divided into two departments. One will be fitted up as a photograph gallery for N. C. Gibson, and the other will be used by Mr. McCall for a manufacturing room.

Everything will be ready in the new building by the middle of October. Mrs. Weldon will conduct her Weldon's exchange in A. I. McCall's old stand.

Everything in the new building will be entirely new and up-to-date, and when it is completed Mr. McCall will have one of the finest buildings in the city.

POPE WILL GET GEM

Rome, Aug. 26.—Pope Leo will soon be the possessor of the largest topaz in the world—the celebrated eight-karat Brazilian gem which belonged to the Neapolitan Bourbons. The stone has been engraved with the image of the Saviour, and will be presented to the Pope at the close of the present jubilee year, by Count Caserta, heir to the Bourbon Kings, along with other rich Neapolitan Catholics.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Premier of Canada, is expected at Rome. It is said that he is coming to urge the Vatican to promote Mr. Falasieco to the Washington Legation; and also for the purpose of negotiating an Italian-Canadian commercial and emigration treaty.

FELL OVERBOARD

New York, Aug. 26.—Capt. C. W. Phillips, commander of the Panama Railway Co.'s steamship Advance, disappeared at sea on Aug. 21, during the voyage of that vessel from Colon to this port. He was 62 years of age, and resided in Brooklyn. He had been ill for a long time, but recovered his health and returned to duty this trip. It was thought on board that while leaning over the rail he was attacked by vertigo and fell into the sea.

On the outward voyage, on Aug. 10, Harry Briscoe, aged 40 years, chief cook, a native of Scotland, disappeared. He is supposed to have jumped overboard.
