#### TAKING 203-METRE HIL

Cost the Japanese 15,000 Men in Twenty-Four Hours.

Attacks Planned to Dec. 10, When It Is Hoped the Capture of Port Arthur patch - Rejoicing in Japan-Many Recruits Join the Colors-Prominent Officers Wounded,

London, Dec. 2.—The correspondent at the Foo of The Daily Telegraph says that the attack on 203 Metre Hill resulted in heavy losses to the first division of the Japanese stormers, and that simultaneously stormers of the ninth and eleventh divisions advanced and menaced the Rihlung and Keekwan forts. It is stated, the correspondent adds that within the last 24 hours, the Japan-ese casualties have totalled 15,000, and it is asserted that the attacks have been planned to until Dec. 10, when it is hoped the capture of Port Arthur will be completed.

Tokio, Dec. 2.—The Imperial Army Headquarters has announced that the Japanese troops besieging Port Arthur are in possession of 203-Metre Hill. The following despatch has been given out:

"The army commenced a bombardment against 203-Metre Hill at dawn, Nov. 30, and made several charges before 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Owing to the enemy's stubborn resistance, the charges failed. noon. Owing to the enemy's stubborn resistance, the charges failed. At 5 o'clock in the afternoon our force advanced against the southeastern portion of the hill, made a flerce charge and reached within thirty metres of the summit. At 7 o'clock, with reinforcements, we charged to the top, which was occupied by our forces. Against the northeastern part of the hill we also charged, and at 8 o'clock the entire fort on the summit fell into our hands.

"The Russians left heaps of dead bodies on the eastern side of the hill, but we have had no time to investi-

General Nogi's telegram announcing the storming and capture of 203-Metre Hill was received with cheers by the Japanese people. It revives the hope of an early capture of Port Arthur proper. The people have never despaired of the success of the besiegers, but the fortitude of the defenders and the prolongation of the siege, which exceeds by months the most liberal preliminary estimate of the time required to accom-lish the reduction of this strong-old, have been a source of deep re-ret, combined with the loss of life, and disappointment over the fact that the siege has occupied such a large force of men, decreasing Field Marshal Oyama's strength at a time when he needed every available man, Many Recruits Join the Colors.

Yesterday was the date set under the conscription act when recruits could join the army. Cheered by the news from Gen. Nogi, thousands of recruits throughout the empire marched to barracks and donned uniforms for the first time. Following an honored custom, the relatives of the recruits, carrying flags and baners, escorted the new soldiers to their barracks. In Tokio yesterday, their barracks. In lokic yesterday, there were scores of little processions escorting detachments of popular conscripts. The number of men who have joined the colors yesterday under the conscription act has not been made public.

Two Prominent Officers Wounded. Reports from the Japanese army besieging Port Arthur says that Lieut.-Gen. Thuchiya is among the wounded and that Gen. Nakamura, the leader of the specially trained body of swordsmen which charged into the Russian forts November 26, was injured in both legs.

Skirmishing Near Mukden. Dec. 2.-There was a er small skirmish on Gen. Rennen-kampt's front on Nov. 30, but other-wise everything remains quiet here. The weather is warmer and more

Why Cruise Was Shortened.

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—Commander Spain has returned from Lake Erie, where he went with the Minister of Marine to take a cruise on the Vigilant. The commander states that the weather is very cold on the lake and owing to this fact the Vigilant's cruise has been curtailed. About Dec. 20 the Atlantic cruiser Canada will start for the West Indies with a crew of 86 men.

Snowed For Thirty Hours.

Madrid, Dec. 2.—The heaviest snowstorm experienced in Spain in many years, lasting nearly 30 hours, has compelled a partial cessation of business. The markets are without supplies, and 60,000 workmen are out of employment. The authorities are taking all possible measures of relief.

Seven Times President. City of Mexico, Mex., Dec. 2.—The inauguration of General Diaz as president of the Republic of Mexico for the seventh time and for Senor Don. Ramon Corral as first vice-president, took place yesterday in the hall of the Chamber of Deputies under most auspicious circumstances.

Seo Rails Already Made.

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—The 20,000 tons of steel rails ordered by the Government from the Soo works have all been manufactured, and on inspection appear to be satisfactory and of good quality. Delivery of all the rails has not yet been made at Mon-

treal. Noted Safe Blower Arrested.

Chicago, Dec. 2.—Kid Leary, veteran safe blower, who is said to have stolen more than \$500,000 in his career, has been arrested after a determined resistance. He was surprised while asleep.
