#### ROOM DEFECTS.

They Can Be Modified by Treatment of Walls and Floors.

All defects in size and shape of rooms and halls can to a large extent be modified or overcome to such a de-gree by the treatment given to walls and floor that the faulty construction will no longer appear conspicuous.

For instance, a room that is too long for the width may materially be changed by running across the middle of the room a deep Japanese lattice of fretwork, and from this suspend a double portiere. This breaks up an un-pleasant distance and if the lattice is open admits sufficient light for that part of the room. Moreover, the portieres can be left partly open and need never be closed entirely unless a very cozy effect is desirable. If a carpet is used on the floor it should extend to the baseboard without a border, as this apparently increases the floor space. If rugs are preferred select several to spread across the width of the floor rather than one or two long ones down the middle of the room, as the more horizontal lines are introduced the wider will seem the room.

The ceiling of a low studded room will appear farther off if the treatment of the walls has a pronounced perpendicular design, and it will appear still higher if the picture rail is omitted entirely, or, if too great a necessity to exclude, place it close up to the cove. The height of the room will appear greater, too, if by skillful treatment the size of the ceiling space be apparently reduced so as to give the effect of receding. This may be accomplished by border, either paper, stencil or the introduction of some form of decoration that will leave a smaller space or surface plain.-Exchange.

#### THE UPRIGHT PIANO.

Seat Scheme That Solves the Exposed Back Problem.

Japanese Salad.

Here is a Japanese salad: One cup of hot boiled rice drained dry and mixed with a small onion chopped fine. While the rice is still warm mix with a French dressing and set aside to get cold. Open a can of sardines, wipe the little fish dry of oil, removing the skin and backbones. Carefully mix the rice and the sardines, heap in the center of a dish of crisp lettuce leaves and cover with a French dressing. Sprinkle chopped chives over all. Beet shreds are also good as a garnish for this salad. The Japanese use raw beets for the purpose, but Americans will prefer them cooked. Cut in slices and with a thin vegetable knife cut into julienne straws.

Salmon Curry. Fry half a small onion chopped ve y til a light brown. Add to it the liques drained from a can of salmon and a half a cup of water. Simmer five min-utes, strain and return to the fire. Add half a tablespoonful of flour rubbed smooth in a little cold water, one teaspoonful of curry powder, one tea-spoonful of lemon juice, salt and pep-per to taste. When boiling add the salmon broker in large fakes. Simmer five minutes and serve.
