## SMALL-POX INVESTIGATION

Authorities in Florence Say  
That Cases are  
Chicken-Pox

### THE LOCAL COMPLAINT

The following letter published in the London Free Press refers to a matter in which this city is particularly interested:

"Editor Free Press: Allow me to contradict a statement which appeared in your paper to-day, one which was written either in haste or while the writer was laboring under the influence of most extreme imagination. The statement I refer to is that which accuses the Board of Health negligence in not properly looking after certain supposed small-pox cases which are supposed to have existed near Dresden and Florence. I, as Medical Health Officer for the Township of Dawn (where all such cases, as far as I can find out, have existed), was notified of such cases about three weeks ago by Dr. Kelly, of Florence, who diagnosed them as chicken-pox. I saw some of them myself and again in consultation with Dr. Kelly, and agree with him that it is only chicken-pox, some of them showing serious, and none of them showing any symptoms of small-pox. Hoping you will contradict this erroneous statement.—A. P. Chalmers, M. D.

"Ed. Note.—The statement appearing in these columns, to which Dr. Chalmers refers, was a complaint on the part of Chatham against the municipalities referred to. This complaint was lodged with the Provincial Health Officers, and alleged that small-pox patients were not being properly quarantined. Dr. Chalmers gives another side to the story."

## CAUGHT BY POLICE

Farm Hand Near Pelham Arrested on Charge of Murder.

Niagara Falls, Ont., July 18.—A man named Bailey was brought here early yesterday by Chief of Police Mains, Ontario Officer Pay of this city, and Detective Thompson of Middletown, Conn.

The man is wanted at Middletown for the alleged murder of a farmer named Goodall on July 6. It is claimed Bailey worked for Goodall, murdered his victim by hitting him on the head with an axe as he sat in a chair, and decamped with about five hundred dollars of his victim's money, taking with him his victim's horse and rig, abandoning it in the woods a few miles from Middletown.

It was a day or two before the crime was known, as Goodall lived alone. Detective Thompson traced Bailey to the Niagara frontier, and there lost track of him. He took Chief Mains into his confidence a day or two ago, and he located Bailey at Albert Discher's, a farmer of North Pelham, about 15 miles west of here.

When arrested he strongly denied his guilt. He had about seventy dollars in his possession when arrested. It is said he is a brother-in-law of Albert Discher. The man is about 40 years of age. He waives extradition.
