The Piano Recital.
A good audience assembled in College Hall last Friday evening to listen to the recital given by the students in piano at Acadia Seminary, under the direction of Prof. Maxin. The entertainment given was a most enjoyable one and was an excellent exhibition of the general proficiency of the school in pianoforte playing. The selections covered a wide range, representing both the romantic period and delicate music with something of the dynamic variety to the rendering of which the modern instrument is so well adapted.

Miss Hazel Wortman's "Theme and Variations," from Schubert, and Miss Edith Spuden's Sonata, from Beethoven, were admirably executed as were Love's Dream, from Liszt and Etincelles, from Moszkowski, by Miss Alice Huntington, of the post-graduate department.

Rubenstein was represented by Miss May Woodman, and Phillip by Miss Henderson, while Miss Lillian Strong gave selections from Hoffman and Sinding; Miss Faulein Price from Bendel and Miss Lavina Lewis from Bartlett. Several of these compositions were new to a Wolfville audience but the sympathetic interpretation of these by the players made them thoroughly enjoyable. The piece de resistance of the evening was a concerto with orchestral parts played by Miss Evelyn Durice and Professor Maxin, on two instruments. It abounded in rich harmony and spirited movement and made a fitting close to a delightful entertainment.

An enthusiastic crowd greeted the Acadia-Yarmouth game at the rink on Friday evening last. The teams were well matched in size and a fine game was played. The Wolfville boys kept the home team on the jump, but the Yarmouths succeeded in placing the puck within their opponents' goal four times to their two. Mr R. R. Wallace carried off the honors for the home team, making three goals, and Capt. Hal. Cann the other one. The visitors played a good game all around and received as hearty applause as our own boys. They were entertained at the Queen hotel and left next morning for home.—Yarmouth Herald.
