## Tenders for Dredging

SEALED Tenders, addressed to the undersigned and endorsed "Tender for dredging, Canso," etc., as the case may be, will be received until 12 o'clock noon, Monday, July 31, 1922, for dredging required at Canso, Digby, Malagash, St. Mary's River and Wolfville, N. S. Tenders will not be considered unless made on the forms supplied by Department and according to conditions set forth therein.

Combined specifications and form of tender can be obtained on application to the undersigned. Tenders must include the towing of the plant to and from the work.

The dredges and other plant which are intended to be used on the work shall have been duly registered in Canada at the time of the filing of the tender with the Department, or shall have been built in Canada after the filing of the tender.

Contractors must be ready to begin work within twenty days after the date they have been notified of the acceptance of their tender.

Each tender must be accompanied by an accepted cheque on a chartered bank, payable to the order of the Minister of Public Works, for 5 per cent of the contract price, but no cheque to be for less than fifteen hundred dollars. War Loan Bonds of the Dominion will also be accepted as security or war bonds and cheques if required to make up an odd amount.

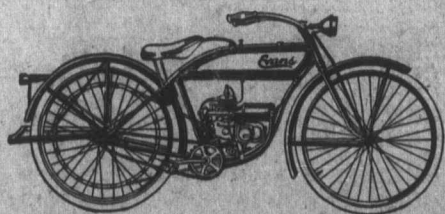
