A Live Town.
Its Business and Who Makes It.

The Industries of Amherst.—Boot and Shoe and Leather Business.—Stoves and Machinery.—The Building Trade, &c., &c.

No town in the Maritime Provinces has taken the same strides forward in the march of natural improvement within the past few years as Amherst. True, other towns have grown up—but the development of Amherst, not being dependent upon the vicissitudes of the lumber interests, as some others, not called into existence by such fortuitous circumstances as the exigencies of railway rulers, not erected at the bidding of any manufacturing industry, its growth has been steady without a set-back, moving forward as the resources of the surrounding country became developed, and the business and prosperity of its environs increased. It is only by looking at the community from periods of years that one can obtain a true sense of its growth or otherwise, and measured by this test, the growth of Amherst has been remarkable. Its industries in 1861 are recorded as follows:

Thus the manufacturing industries twenty years ago absorbed less than \$10,000 capital and employed 50 hands. The comparison between those figures and the ones we offer to-day of five leading industries, all established within a recent period, afford tolerably good evidence of progress.

No one looking at the great and varied resources of Cumberland County, its lumbering interests, the quarrying properties, the vast agricultural wealth, and the mines of coal, controlled or owned at Amherst, can for one moment doubt that Amherst is destined in the future, to be one of the four or five great centres of wealth and industrial enterprise of the Maritime Provinces. The leading industry is the

BOOT AND SHOE FACTORY.
This is one of the most flourishing industries of the Lower Provinces; and is a most striking illustration of the success of this branch of manufacture, under careful and experienced management.

About fifteen years ago the Amherst Boot & Shoe Co. was organized, and transacted business for some time under the management of Mr. E. S. Crafts. Subsequently the Steam Tanning Co. was organized; and was managed by Mr. C. R. Casey; each Company enjoying a fair business for some years. At this time the firm of Price & Quigley (composed of Mr. M. D. Price, the Company's present manager, and Mr. David Quigley) were doing a large and profitable boot and shoe business in Amherst; and it was proposed that an amalgamation of the different companies, viz: The Amherst Boot & Shoe Co., the Amherst Steam Tanning Co., and Messrs. Price & Quigley, be effected. These proposals after a time were carried out, and on May 15th, 1875 the three Companies amalgamated, under the name and style of the Amherst Boot, Shoe & Tanning Co.

The officers for the first year under the new Company were J. T. Smith, Esq., President; Mr. M. D. Price, manager of the Boot & Shoe department, and Mr. C. R. Casey, manager of the tanning branch.

The Company, with strong boots and fresh capital, began at once to extend their business, and commenced the manufacture of boots and shoes, on an increased scale in Moffat's block; the tanning branch also receiving a new impetus, and yielding fair profits.

The Company employed for two years a prosperous business prior to 1877, which seemed to be a year of reverses for the boot and shoe manufacturers of the Dominion. It will be remembered that in 1877 a large number of nearly all kinds of manufacturers, dealers and traders throughout the Dominion had to succumb to the hardness of the times; and either failed, or compromised.

years prior to May 15th, 1878. In the same year the tanning branch of the Company, together with the tanning site and what machinery was left from the fire was sold to Mr. C. R. Casey; the Company continuing the manufacture of boots and shoes in Moffat's block. For the year ending May 15th, 1878, and the succeeding year no dividend was paid owing to the Company's losses above named; but by careful management together with the influx of better times throughout the country, the business of the Company again assumed healthy proportions—the stock again reaching its par value—and from this time forward the affairs of the Company seem to have gone from one step to another of prosperity. For the year ending May 15th, 1880, a dividend of 6 per cent. was paid, a portion of the profits having been placed to rest account. The sales of the Company for that year were \$79,000. In 1879 the demand having exceeded the Company's facilities for manufacture, a large three-story building was erected in the rear of Moffat's block, to be used as a factory in conjunction with the other premises; the Company's retail business having increased so as to require more room in the block on Main street.

On May 15th, 1881, a dividend of 10 per cent. was paid, a portion of the profits going as usual to increase the rest account; this course being deemed the best by the Directors. The sales of the Company for that year were \$93,000, or about 17 1/2 per cent. advance of the previous year. On May 15th, 1882, the rest account receiving its usual addition, the sales for the year being \$120,000, or over 25 per cent. in advance of the previous year. The business having about reached the extent of their present manufacturing facilities, the manager is enabled to fill present orders, only by working extra time. Only first class workmen are employed; the result being that the Company have gained an enviable reputation for the superiority of their manufactures.

The business of this Company extends over Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and parts of New Brunswick and Newfoundland, and orders from Manitoba are awaiting shipment. There are at present about ninety hands employed by the Company, and the wages paid, averaging nearly \$500 per week, or \$20,000 per year, are paid directly, or indirectly into the hands of the mechanics, traders and farmers of the County. The amount paid in cash for wages alone since the amalgamation, being over \$125,000, has been spent in the place, the business men and traders of Amherst, in common with all, reaping the general benefits resulting from the establishment and maintenance of such industries in our midst.

Thirty-five of the Company's employees are heads of families, representing as many houses to be kept up, which shows to some extent the employees' contributions to the revenues of the town, in the way of taxation. It is very gratifying to the manager that there is such a small percentage of the employees addicted to the use of intoxicants; the churches and temperance organizations finding in many, most substantial support. The Company are to be congratulated on the present prosperous state of their business, and it must be a source of great satisfaction to the stockholders generally, but especially to those more largely interested, who risked their capital and stood by the business during the days of their reverses and losses, that they are now making a fair remuneration in the shape of cash dividends, with the fullest confidence in the future prosperity of the Company.

The Company's retail department, which occupies one of the large stores on Moffat's block, fronting on Main street, has always been a valuable auxiliary, the receipts from this branch for the last year being over \$20,000. This store, which is kept neat and clean, is always well stocked; and a look through it satisfies the observer that the requirements of all can be readily supplied; in the men's fine French cut hand-sewed boots at \$6.00 to the brogans at \$1.00; and from the ladies' high-toned French cut button boot at \$5.00 to the split hair at \$0.25, with boys', youths', children's and infants' wear in great variety.

AMHERST STEAM TANNERY.
One of the foremost among our manufacturing industries is that of Messrs. C. R. Casey & Son who carry on an extensive steam tanning business. They have now in their employ 13 men, and turn out about 175 sides of leather a week and as many splits. They manufacture all kinds of leather, and oil animal skins. In connection with this establishment is a department for the manufacture of morocco finished road skis; this branch is under the superintendence of Mr. A. C. Casey, junior member of the firm, who obtained a thorough knowledge of the business in the United States. About 12,000 finished skins are turned out in a year from this department. One cannot go through this establishment without being impressed with the push and enterprise of the operators.

CHRISTIE'S FLAMING MILL.
Another important manufacturing industry is that of Messrs. Christie Brothers & Company who carry on a large business in making coffins and caskets, hobs, mouldings—straight and regular, and planing and matching lumber. To meet the requirements of their rapidly increasing business they have put up a large building 38x60 and three storeys high, the lower flat of which is divided into an office, store and trimming rooms, and the upper flats to be used in the manufacture of coffins and caskets. This branch of the business is under the supervision of Mr. E. B. Phelan, a member of the firm, who became thoroughly familiar with the intricate part of the business in the United States. They have orders from all parts of the Dominion for coffins and caskets, and their work meets with universal satisfaction.

One of the firm attends to the undertaking business, which they also give attention, and their headquarters is one of the finest in the Province.

AMHERST WOOD FACTORY.
Messrs. Rhodes, Curry & Co., manufacturers and builders, conduct probably the largest business in their line in this part of Canada, and add a large item to the aggregate of business done in Amherst. On their pay roll inside is about 50 men and the same number on outside contracts. They are now working at contracts that amount to \$70,000, in three Provinces, viz: N. B., N. S., and Newfoundland. The business men and traders of Amherst, in common with all, reaping the general benefits resulting from the establishment and maintenance of such industries in our midst.

Thirty-five of the Company's employees are heads of families, representing as many houses to be kept up, which shows to some extent the employees' contributions to the revenues of the town, in the way of taxation. It is very gratifying to the manager that there is such a small percentage of the employees addicted to the use of intoxicants; the churches and temperance organizations finding in many, most substantial support. The Company are to be congratulated on the present prosperous state of their business, and it must be a source of great satisfaction to the stockholders generally, but especially to those more largely interested, who risked their capital and stood by the business during the days of their reverses and losses, that they are now making a fair remuneration in the shape of cash dividends, with the fullest confidence in the future prosperity of the Company.

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The upper story of the machine shop has been recently fitted up for a pattern shop and new machinery has been added to assist in the rapid turning out of patterns, flasks, etc. The moulding shop has also been enlarged, making it 125x50.

The casting department is conducted by Mr. John White, who has been in the foundry since the opening, seventeen years ago. The quality and smoothness of the castings produced is a good indication of Mr. White's ability.

The stove mounting shop has also been enlarged and improved, its present size being 70x80, and new machinery has been added for the finishing and mounting of stoves.

The whole establishment is under the superintendence of Mr. D. W. Robb.

The retail warehouse (which are connected with the foundry by telephone) and the financial department of the business are conducted by Mr. F. B. Robb, and Mr. W. R. Robb fills the position of book-keeper.

Messrs. Robb informed our reporter that although the orders for stoves have been held until late in the season, that orders are now coming in rapidly, large shipments are being made daily, and they expect from the present indications that their full stock of ranges, base burners, cook, parlor, hall, office and shop stoves, farmers' furnaces, plows, and vessel stoves, will be entirely exhausted before the end of the year.

This firm makes a specialty of the Walker range, and have successfully heated a large number of churches, shops, and private dwellings, in every part of the Maritime Provinces and have on hand at present a large number of contracts for heating buildings.

They have orders from all parts of the Dominion for coffins and caskets, and their work meets with universal satisfaction.

mate, McDougall, and two others, names unknown. The boat finally stranded near Point au Barre about daylight on Friday, with Miss Morrison and myself the only two surviving. I put the bodies on the beach and tried the boat off with an oar, but did not bale it out. Miss Morrison and I went down the beach in the boat to a derrick about one and a half miles distant, and lay on the beach all night. About eight o'clock Saturday morning an Indian came along and I engaged him to bring us to Parry Sound. He would not bring the bodies.

TO THE RESCUE.
The steamer "Northern Belle," of the same line, which reached here this morning, had been furnished with ice, etc., and has left for the bodies. Miss Morrison and Mr. Tinkins are well cared for here, and Dr. Potts thinks neither will suffer materially from their long exposure. There were probably about one hundred on board the "Asia."

Canada vs. United States.
Emigration to Canada and especially to Manitoba, has been so often recommended of late that but for the obvious fact that emigrants still prefer to go elsewhere, there would seem to be no use in mentioning the subject again. But for some reason or other the United States appear irresistibly attractive to the minds of intending emigrants, and our own colonies receive only a small share of the stream of humanity across the Atlantic. The total emigration to Canada in 1881 from all parts of the world was only 47,391; while of these 3,758 came from the United States and settled in Manitoba alone. The significance of these figures needs no comment. For, when more than three thousand citizens of the American Republic, with their proverbial character for practical shrewdness, find it worth while to exile themselves to a British colony, it ought to be obvious to Englishmen about to emigrate that Manitoba rather than New York should be their destination also. If more of those Britishers who find the old country too cramped and overstocked to remain at home were to make up their minds to settle in Canada, we should fearlessly of those pitiable tales told in English police courts by gangs of stowaways from America, such as that which we called attention only the other day, The report of the Minister of agriculture of Canada, on the other hand, shows that at the present moment the whole colony is in a remarkably prosperous condition, the only drawback, as matters stand at present, being insufficient emigration.

THE BOATS LOWERED.
I saw three boats lowered. I was in the first boat, and about eight were with me at first. More got in till the boat was overloaded and turned over. Two parties were hanging on to my life preserver, which got displaced and I threw it off. I then left the boat and swam to the cabin boy, which was near by, and asked Mr. John McDougall, the purser, to help me in. He said it was but little use, but gave me his hand. When I got in there were eighteen in the captain's boat, and by that time there was a large number in and clinging to the boat I had left. I know nothing of the third boat. Our boat rolled over, and I remember missing poor John McDougall a few minutes after he helped me in. People were hanging on to the spars and other parts of the wreckage.

SUFFERINGS OF SURVIVORS.
Our boat was full of water, and the sea was constantly breaking over us. One of the first to die on the boat was the cabin boy. He was dying and being supported by one of the men, when a wave washed him overboard. The next to go was a oar hand. He was near the gunwale, coughing badly, when he jumped out could see him paddling around in the water for nearly a hundred yards. Our numbers were now reduced to seven, five of whom died before reaching the beach: Capt. Savage, who was the last to die, in my arms about midnight on Thursday, Mr. John Little, of Sault Ste.
