ST. JOHN LUMBER CUT.

Nearly One Hundred and Six Millions Expected to Come Into the Booms This Season.

The meetings of the St. John river and Tobique lumbermen are over and most of the lumbermen have returned home. During their stay here the lumbermen talked over their operations of the past winter and coming summer season.

An estimate of the cut of each lumber operator was yesterday presented at the annual meeting, but these figures are not made public. A representative of THE GLEANER has found out from various sources that the figures below about represent the different operations on the upper St. John, Tobique, Aroostook and Allegash:

Morris, inspector in Northwest Mounted Police. He was a native of this city, but had been identified with the mounted police about twenty-five years.

His wife, who survives, was formerly Miss Whittaker, of this city, and an aunt of Mrs. T. H. Bullock, of St. John. A son and daughter also survive.

Lt. Col. Morris was a son of the late Ald. Thomas Morris of this city and used to be in the clothing business with a store where Mr. J. D. Fowler now has his jewelry establishment.

Mrs. Lipsett, wife of the late Chief Lipsett of the Fire Department, was a sister of Col. Morris, who was therefore the uncle of Mr. Harry and Miss Nellie Lipsett.

Mrs. Andrew Burrill and Mrs. Hedley Barbour, of St. John, are sisters of the late Col. Morris and Edwin Morris, formerly of Philadelphia and now of St. John, Gilbert Morris, of Pittsburgh, Pa., and George Morris, of Brooklyn, N. Y., are brothers.

A despatch to THE GLEANER yesterday stated that Lt. Col. Morris had been stricken with paralysis on Tuesday.
