A New Questions and Answers Department of Interest to Shooters

Readers are reminded that this column is open to questions which should be sent to me in care of the Sporting Editor, and to discussions by the readers on anything connected with hunting or target shooting.—A. P. L.

C. T. B., Clinton Forge, Va.
What length barrel, whether modified, full choke or cylinder, will shoot most closely such shot as fowls and doves?
Ans. The length of barrel makes no difference. Full choke bore barrels will give closest shooting. Some full choke barrels as furnished by the makers will handle small shot, better than the large shot, whereas others handle the large shot better. In placing your order, it would be a good idea to specify the size shot you expect to use and the barrel could then be selected to give you the closest possible shooting with the size you intend to use.

1. What rifle is the more powerful, the 10 M.M Italian or the 41 Swiss?
Ans. They are practically the same.

2. What calibre rifle would you recommend for ducks, geese and wolves?
Ans. One of the .25 calibre metal case bullet cartridges would be satisfactory.

3. Do you think black powder would work as well as smokeless in a .41 calibre Swiss center fire cartridge?
Ans. The .41 calibre Swiss center fire cartridge is not made in this country. So far as I know black powder can be used.

4. Do you know of any firm that makes the 10 M.M cartridges, moulds or reloading tools?
Ans. No.

Inquirer, Oconomowoc, Wis.
1. How many times more powerful is gun cotton than smokeless rifle powder?
Ans. This question is impossible to answer—as you do not say what kind of smokeless rifle powder. There are a number of varieties of them of various powers. Gun cotton is, of course, very much more powerful than any of the regular smokeless powders. Gun cotton is made by treating cotton fibre with nitric and sulphuric acids. The process is of course very complicated and extremely dangerous unless carried out under proper conditions. Smokeless rifle powders are usually nitro cellulose powders made from wood fibre instead of cotton fibre. There are also a number of powders made up from nitro glycerine. In this case glycerine is used instead of cotton or wood fibre.

2. Would an explosive bullet shoot as true in a high power rifle as in other rifles?
Ans. There are no explosive bullets made, i. e., bullets containing explosive mixture.

3. Has the United States Government the Model 1892 Coits .38 or 41 calibre revolvers for sale? I think they were used in the Spanish-American war. If the Government has sold them to a company could

Editorial Comment

CONSERVATIVES ARE ORGANIZING ON P. E. I.

The Liberal-Conservatives of Prince County, P. E. I., have begun work of organization, and at a convention held at Summerside on the 1st inst., Mr. A. A. LeFurgey was nominated as their standard-bearer. The Summerside Journal's account of the convention was in part as follows:

"The Liberal-Conservative Convention held here on Saturday last was the most thoroughly representative gathering of the workers of the grand old Conservative party in this county for a long time. The spacious hall was filled to its full capacity with delegates. Every poll in Prince County was represented, and in nearly every case by the full number allowed.

Harmony and good will was the order of the day and everything progressed as smoothly as clock-work with the exception of a single individual who appeared to have an imaginary grievance not enjoyed by anyone else in the meeting and which was entirely wiped off the slate by Senator Murphy in his able speech delivered at the afternoon meeting.

Neil McQuarrie, K. C., President of East Prince Liberal Conservative Association and Mr. P. J. Bulger, President of the West Prince Association occupied their usual places on the platform accompanied by their Secretaries, Heath Strong and Kier Ramsay, and also a number of prominent politicians among whom were—Donald Nicholson, M. P. for Queen's County, Senator Murphy, Speaker Wyatt, Hon. Chas. Dalton, H. T. Dobie, M. L. A., M. M. Delaney, M. L. A., Hon. Jas. A. McNeill, S. T. Gallant, M. L. A., also the committee on credentials viz.—W. P. Callaghan, Mr. Huestis, J. J. Gallant, Gordon Dawson and E. W. Manson.

After the delegates had recorded their votes with the respective secretaries nominations were declared in order. Mr. John A. Hockett, Tignish, proposed, and Mr. Gordon Dawson, Cape Traverse, seconded the nomination of Mr. A. A. LeFurgey. Further nominations were asked for but as none were forthcoming Mr. McQuarrie asked for a standing vote and the whole meeting rose en masse, except the party referred to above who was on his feet and did not sit down. A more unanimous expression of opinion could not be asked for and all were highly pleased with the result.

The grand old party throughout the entire constituency will no doubt be proud of the choice made by such a representative body of delegates as were present. In Mr. LeFurgey, they have a candidate who will carry its standard to victory when the time arrives, and the electors of Prince County are called upon to make their choice of a representative to the Commons of Canada. He possesses the energy and ability to do more for his party than anyone else in sight. This does not mean there are not many good men in this constituency who are eligible, but the fact alone that he showed his capability to do more for Prince County while occupying an opposition seat in the Commons of Canada than any government representative in that body has done for many years past, proves pretty conclusively he has the energy, ability and working power required and admired in a standard bearer.

The Conservative party has a good clean platform and the nominee has ability to place that platform in its proper light before the electors and the fortitudes to fulfil any pre-election promise he may make."

Resolutions were passed tendering congratulations to The Right Honourable Sir Robert L. Borden and to Honourable J. A. Mathieson, Premier of Prince Edward Island. At the conclusion of the meeting, cheers for Sir Robt. L. Borden, A. A. LeFurgey, Hon. J. A. Mathieson, Senator Murphy and others were given with full tiger finish, and the most enthusiastic convention in the history of the Conservative party in Prince County was closed by everybody joining in the National Anthem with a hearty good will.

CLEAN-UP DAY

The inauguration of the clean-up day which is set by the mayor for Friday of this week, is not calculated to rob the estimable housewife of any of the prerogatives which from time immemorial have been associated with the spring housecleaning campaign. That terror to the mere male fragment of the household stands in no danger of extinction while the domestic spirit is preserved. On the contrary, the clean-up crusade simply means the extension of the house-cleaning campaign into the great out-of-doors. The domain of madame's clean-up and tidy-up operations, which is bounded on the north and south or on the east and west by the front and rear entrances to the home, will not be invaded, but the lord of the manor and the "small fry" of the household will, it is hoped, learn some lessons of thoroughness from the renovation of the inner sanctuary. It is also hoped that they may be "enthused" by what they have learned from observation in the home and resume with vigor a duty toward the outer spaces to which they have long been careless and often callous.

It is not easy to form habits where much striving is required, but the results of the proposed clean-up campaign should be an inspiring recollection for succeeding years. In the mayor's programme beauty as well as utility is sought after. This should afford a double inspiration. Just think—your exertions faithfully directed will mean not only a clean and healthy Newcastle but a beautiful Newcastle.

GENERAL JOFFRE ON DRINK

"It is the duty of all patriots to fight alcoholism in all its forms. Everyone must understand that anything capable of diminishing the moral and material strength of our army constitutes a real crime against national defence in face of the enemy."

These words are the prelude of a decree signed by Gen. Joffre and communicated to the newspapers of Nancy. The commander-in-chief of the allied armies absolutely forbids the sale of intoxicating liquors to the troops in the army zone. The only alcohol allowed to the soldiers is the quantity distributed in the rations. "Treating" is also strictly forbidden. Anyone, whether he is a wineshop keeper or not, who is guilty of violating Gen. Joffre's orders will be court-martialled.

Northumberland Boy Writes Letter Home

His Battalion Has Been in Trenches Several Times

France Siss, April 11th, 1915
Dear Mother,
I am sending you a few lines letting you know that I am well. I received your letter the 6th of this month, and was pleased to hear from you, and to know that you were well.

The Ninth Battalion was all split up, and I was transferred to the Third Battalion, and we left England the 7th of February, and now it is two months I have been in France. I have been in the firing line quite a lot since coming to France, and seen quite a few Germans. They worked it so that we went into the trenches for four days, and then came out, and rested four days, and so on for four times. At present we are resting in a billet barn on a French farm. It is two weeks since we left the trenches and we may go back to them in three or four days again. I have come off pretty lucky, and did not get hit with any bullets, although they were flying pretty thick and close to me sometimes. Well mother I would like you to send me some McDonald chewing tobacco, for it is hard to get hold of any kind over here, and what you do get is no good. Tell Hugh I am glad he is not here, for a fellow has to be very careful or he will get court martialled. There has been some fellows shot for disobeying orders, for when you are in the army you cannot do as you like. The weather has been very cold here all spring, but it is nice today. We have one blanket each and sleep on the straw in the barn, but all the same we are pretty comfortable. I will close for this time, hoping to hear from you soon again, your loving son,

Tenders will not be considered unless made on the forms supplied, and signed with the actual signatures of tenderers.

Combined specification and form of tender can be obtained on application to the Secretary, Department of Public Works, Ottawa. Tenders must include the towing of the plant to and from the work.

The Dredges and other plant which are intended to be employed on this work shall have been duly registered in Canada at the time of the filing of this tender with the Department, or shall have been built in Canada after the filing of the tender.

Contractors must be ready to begin work within thirty days after the date they have been notified of the acceptance of their tender.

Each tender must be accompanied by an accepted cheque on a chartered bank, payable to the order of the Honourable the Minister of Public Works, for five per cent. (5 p.c.) of the contract price, but no cheque to be for less than fifteen hundred dollars, which will be forfeited if the person tendering decline to enter into a contract when called upon to do so, or fail to complete the work contracted for. If the tender be not accepted the cheque will be returned.
