On motion of Coun. Pond it was resolved that the pay for sheep killed by dogs be \$5.00 per animal if Parish Funds are sufficient to pay same.

Coun. Pond of Petitions Committee recommended the following: That Mrs. Margaret Mahony be relieved of payment of income taxes in Rogersville.

That Vincent Rolland be relieved of 1920 taxes in Parish of South Esk.

That no refund be made to Hiram Drillon, Parish of Derby.

That petition of residents of Taxis River re running at large of cattle be granted within; the following boundaries: On the South side of South West Miramichi River between Taxis River and the York County Line to include the Taxis River Bridge.

That the license fee for a pool room in the Parish of Blackville be ten dollars per table per year or fraction thereof, and anyone violating the bye law be liable to a fine of \$8.00.

That the Petition of the Residents of South Esk re the running of a County line be referred to the whole Council for discussion.

After some discussion re the line it was on motion of Coun. Parker left of the table for one year.

On motion of Coun. Savoy the Rogersville Parish Accounts passed.

On motion of Coun. Savoy a committee of three were appointed re the establishment of a lock-up at Rogersville. Committee. Couns Gill,

Savoy, Chaisson.

On motion of Coun. L. Doyle the following resolution passed:

"Whereas death has removed from amongst us one of our honored and esteemed fellow Councillors John W. Vanderbeck, and whereas the long intimate and cordial relations held with him in the faithful and conscientious discharge of his duties as a member of this Council, makes it imperative that we record our appreciation of him as a Councillor and a man. Therefore.

Resolved that his sound judgement and strict integrity in dealing with all matters affecting the best interests of the county will be held in grateful remembrance and respect of his memory?

Resolved that the sudden removal of such a life from the sphere of usefulness will be greatly regretted by this council and the public at large.

Resolved that we express our deep sympathy with the bereaved family in the great loss they have sustained.

Resolved that a copy of this resolution be recorded in the minutes of this council, a copy published in the press and a copy forwarded to the bereaved family.

On motion of Coun. Fletcher a special assessment was ordered on the Parish of Nelson for the clearing of sidewalks in District No 1.

Coun. Anderson read the estimates of the Dept. of Public Health and their request for \$6,000.

Coun. Gordon asked if the itemized bill came in for last year.

Coun. Anderson—Yes.

Coun. Gill moved the estimates pass and be assented.

Motion defeated 11 to 16.

Gordon appointed Coun. L. Doyle, Parker, Fletcher, Sinclair and Baldwin to audit J.C. Accounts.

On motion of Coun. Walls the accounts of the Collectors of rates, Parish Clerk's account Blackville passed.

Coun. Holmes moved that whereas Henry Swim had collected \$1,075.73 under agreement with the Board of Valuers and had not accounted for the same to the County, resolved that this be charged to the Contingent Fund until same is recovered from the said Henry Swim.

After some discussion by Coun. Parker, Merseureau, Anderson, Allain, Bransfield. The legal advisor, T. H. Whelan, and the Sec-Treas. W. H. Teed the motion was lost.

Coun. Gill moved that the Management of the C. N. Railway be asked to make Barnaby River a flag stop for the Maritime Express. Carried.

On motion of Coun. Holmes The Accounts of the Collectors of rates, R. Hurley and Wardlow Gilks, passed also Parish officers.

On motion of Coun. Sinclair it was resolved that the Bye-laws be revised by the Sec-Treas and Clerk of the Peace and Printed under the supervision of the Printing Committee.

On motion of Coun. Sinclair the

following North Esk Parish accounts passed: Ernest Mutch, Parish Clerk, \$8.00; Joseph Hosford, district clerk \$8.00.

On motion of Coun. Parker, J. W. Davidson was re-appointed auditor.

Coun. Cripps, moved, seconded by Coun. Fletcher that the per diem allowance to Councillors be \$2.50 per day. Coun. Cripps speaking in support of the motion said that if County officials were to be reduced in salary they should reduce their own.

Coun. Parker opposed the motion Coun. Fletcher said the Councillors were reaching economy and he was anxious to see if they were sincere.

Coun. Cripps said that Coun. L. Doyle had said that if Towns got increased representation one of the first things they would do was increase the sessional allowance, now he opposes decrease.

Motion defeated. Yeas. Couns. D. Doyle, Fletcher, Merseureau, Sullivan, Cripps, 5 Nays—Gordon, Sinclair, Wilson, Pond, Sutherland, Johnston, Manderville, Parker, Weaver, Holmes, Walls, Chaisson, Savoy, Quinn, Watling, Gulliver, Bransfield, Gill, Baldwin, Harriman, Allain, Anderson, D. Doyle—23

On motion of Coun. Sinclair the sum of \$260 was ordered assessed on the Parish of North Esk in support of Pauper Lunatics.

The resignations of E. J. Gallivan, and Randolph Crocker, as County valuers were read and on motion accepted.

On motion the Secretary-Treas was authorized to apply to the Local Legislature to borrow money up to, but not exceeding \$12,000, instead of \$6,000 as now allowed by law.

The following were nominated as valuers: T. M. Gaynor, John Betts, Joseph H. Allain, Otto Hildebrand.

On a ballot being taken T. M. Gaynor received 21 votes, John Betts, 14, Joseph Allain, 12 and O. Hildebrand, 9. Gaynor was declared elected and

on the second ballots being taken Betts, received 16 votes, Allain, 11 and Hildebrand 1 Betts was declared elected.

Council adjourned until 7.30 p. m.

Council met at 7.30 p. m.

On motion of Coun. Anderson the Board of Health Bills for the past year were placed on file.

Coun. Gill read report re committee on lock-up at Rogersville recommending its establishment at a cost of \$300 to be paid by the County.

Coun. Parker opposed the motion If Rogersville was given a lock-up every parish in the county would want one.

Coun. Savoy said the Bye-Laws allowed a lock-up at Rogersville. The revenue, if any would go to the County.

Legal Advisor Whelan said it was very necessary to have a lock-up at Rogersville but did not feel like assessing whole County for it. Let the parish look after it themselves.

Coun. Merseureau suggested that Parish build lock-up and rent it to the County.

Motion lost.

On motion of Coun. L. Doyle the sum of \$31,000 was ordered assessed on the County for Contingencies made up as follows: Officers salaries

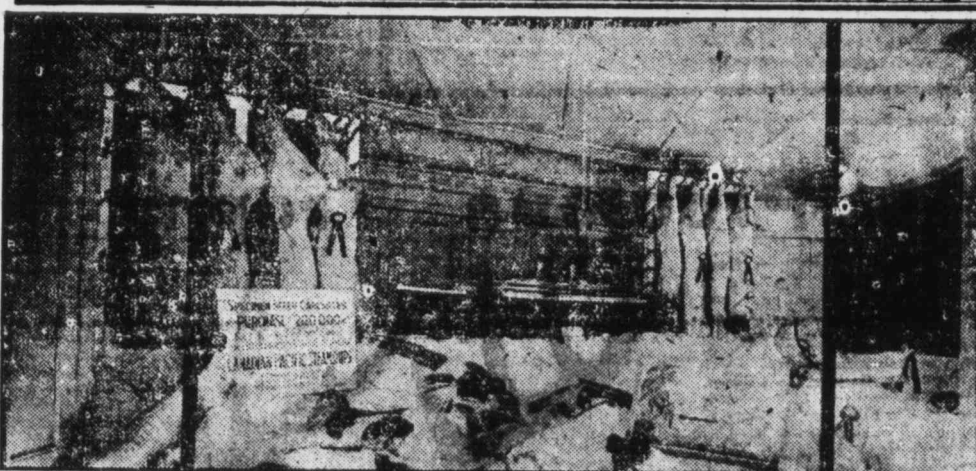
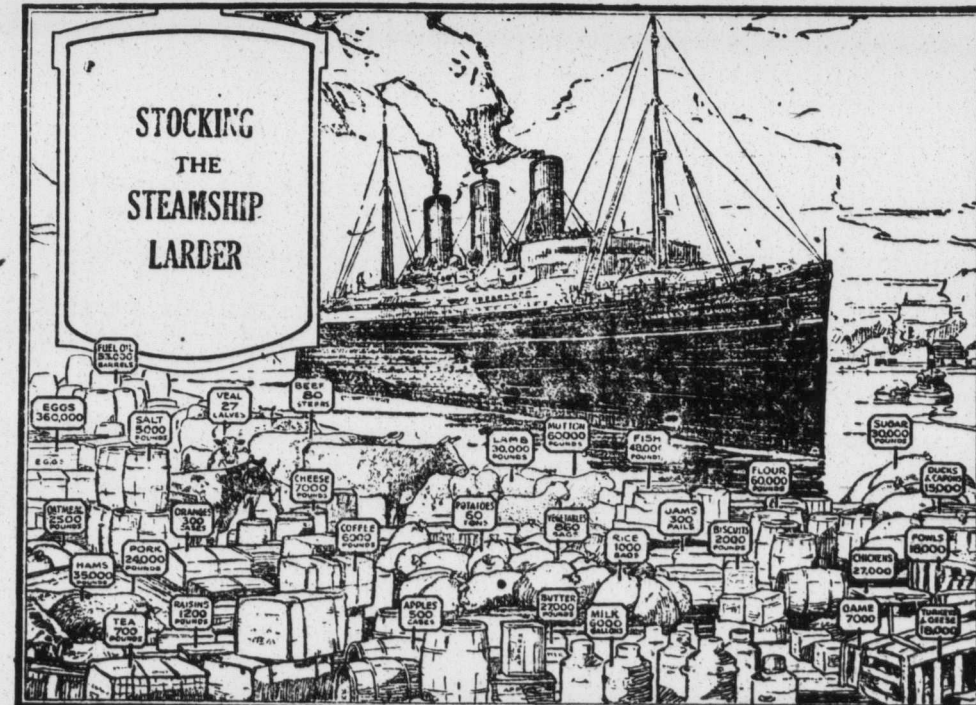

Exhibition in Montreal of steer carcasses weighing 200,000 lbs. and game, to be used on the winter cruises to the Mediterranean and West Indies by the Canadian Pacific Steamers, "Empress of Scotland," "Empress of France" and "Empress of Britain."

Recently prize beef was placed on exhibition in Almy's window, near St. Alexander Street, Montreal, purchased at the Toronto Christmas Show for use on the forthcoming cruises of the C.P.S.L. Steamers "Empress of France," "Empress of Scotland," and "Empress of Britain." It was arranged by the Canadian Pacific Steamships Ltd. The carcasses, all Canadian raised stock are of exceptional quality.

For three cruises the requirements in beef are approximately 175,000 pounds, or in other terms 235 choice steer carcasses with a dressed weight of 750 lbs. each. The turkeys, chickens, capons, ducks and ducklings have been specially fattened for the particular requirements of these cruises, and no cold storage stock of any kind is to be used. The different kinds of poultry are also of uniform weight and dress.

In general the requirements for the Empress of France, Empress of Scotland, and Empress of Britain are as follows:
