Francis Carney, Brussels, is on the sick list. His illness is said to have been caused by an "over dose" from an electric battery.

Mrs. H. Hayden, of Goderich, is on a visit to her brother, Mr. W. T. Yates, Wingham. Mr. Hayden leaves for Manitoba at an early day.

Col. Martin, M.P.P. for Rimouski, Q., was struck with paralysis on Saturday morning in the Parliament House, Quebec, while attending to Legislative duties.

Thomas McLaughlin and his sister, Mrs. Campbell, son and daughter of Donald McLaughlin, Grey, left for Manitoba on Thursday last week. They had been here on a visit for several months.

Peter Pentland, Attwood, died rather suddenly last week. He was at his work on Friday morning and died early Saturday morning. Inflammation was the cause. He was in his 70th year and was a good citizen.

Assistance was soon on hand, the horse hauled out and after a few hours all went on their way rejoicing.

Carried. The clerk was instructed to forward to Ashfield clerk a statement of money spent on North gravel road by this municipality in 1887, and to request a settlement of accounts for that year. The following checks were issued: Township clerk, money to be refunded to Lockwood school trustees—taxes overpaid, \$6.05; M. Young, refund of tax, \$1; John Symington, gravel, \$1; Robt. Murray, auditing books, \$8; John Webster, auditing books, \$8; R. H. Anderson, writing jury list, \$1; John Parks, roadway to Thos. Young, \$6.50; Hugh Moreland, witness fees, gravel arbitration, \$2. Council adjourned to meet on Saturday, April 20th. R. K. Miller, clerk.
