BANKERS PICKED UP.—Two French fishermen of the banker St. Pierre were brought into Cape Broyle yesterday evening after having strayed away from their vessel on the Banks in a thick fog. The message relating this came to the Marine and Fisheries Department.

A CHALLENGE WALKING MATCH.—Next week George Downs who won the 20 mile walking match on Wednesday will challenge Owen Steele, who won out last year, to go over the same course of 20 miles. A substantial prize will be offered, and the match will be pulled off in September.

SOUTHERN SHORE FISHERY.—Mr. Aiden O'Driscoll who was here on business during the week reported that along the Southern Shore there is good fishing. Some traps during the week had over 50 qtls., and dories took from 2 to 6 cwt. each day. The fish are of very large size, and are well distributed in deep and shoal water.
