Councillor Mullaly Replies to Dr. Brehm.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—In yesterday's issue of the papers there appeared a letter from Dr. Brehm, contradicting a report of a meeting of the Municipal Council, held recently to deal with the present outbreak of typhus fever.

Now, Mr. Editor, I wish to say, first, that I am not responsible for the report which appeared in the Daily News which was testified to by the Editor; secondly, that I claim, as one who was present at the meeting, that the statements to be substantially correct; and, thirdly, that I question the propriety of the Doctor, as a servant of the Council, writing to the press on the matter at all.

Having enumerated these facts, it enables me to say with a feeling of certainty that Dr. Brehm is incorrect in charging me with being actuated with feelings of malice towards him, as a City Councillor, I am a representative of all the people, and would have done in the case of any citizen no matter whether he was an employee of mine or not, what I did in the case of O'Neill.

The man O'Neill, alled up to Saturday, the 7th inst., at 1 p.m. On my return from dinner, I was informed by Inspector O'Brien that the disease at Fanning's had been pronounced

typhus fever, and that O'Neill had been locked up in his house. I immediately communicated with Dr. Brehm, and pointed out to him that it appeared to me to be an improper and unwise move to have this man, who was apparently in good health, quarantined in a house reeking with the germs of typhus fever.

The doctor replied that that was the custom in such cases, and that he had no where else to put the man. I replied, "Put him anywhere, put him in jail if you will, but don't put him in a place where he is in danger of contracting the disease."

The doctor said, "I have no control over such places," and I said "All right, doctor, I hope everything will turn out all right."

I again spoke to the doctor on the following Monday morning, and enquired as to O'Neill's condition. He said that he was alright, and upon my again complaining of the hardship inflicted on O'Neill as it appeared to me, he suggested that I might use my influence with the doctor in attendance, to have Fanning removed to the hospital, and then that the house would be disinfected and O'Neill released.

I am in conclusion, I wish to say that the inside history of this typhus outbreak and its genesis has not yet been written. Facts are only now coming to light, one by one, and when all will have been told, I trust that those in whose keeping the health of the city rests, will be able to show as clean a record as
