

LONDON, To-day That this picture of Ulster as an armed camp was a pure figment o the imagination conceived to impress British elector, is the declaration of the special correspondent of the Westninister Gazette, after making a tour of investigation in North and East Ireland. He does not deny the presence of some volunteers, but says that some knowledge is necessary to find them, as otherwise a man might be in Ulster one week and remain unaware of anything save the ordinary round of daily life. No single responsible head of any big business in Belfast was acting as he would if he be lieved civil war only a few months ahead. Editorially the paper declares that any attempt to mislead by such an investigation for partizan purposes would be dangerous as well as unpatriotic.

WASHINGTON, To-day The President told callers while he nad not recalled any formal com nunication on the subject, he had inderstood that European nations generally took the same view as die Great Britian, that the Hay-Paunce fote treaty was violated by the Panama Canal Act. He pointed out that in dealing with foreign affairs, nations which believed States did no treaty as the Hay-Pauncefote Con vention, believed the States would not be likely to be sincere on other de licate questions. Word had come to the President of the general impres sion in Europe that the States was "Sailing as close to the wind as possible." in interpreting promises made its treaties. No pressure had been brought to bear by any nation to emphasize their view in this connect on, but the President felt that foreign Governments had this feeling on the subject. When the House Committee en Interstate Commerce meets it is expected to favorably report on the 3ims Bill and to repeal the exemption clause introduced last year by Sena' tor Root. Representative Palmer o Pennsylvania announced that a pol! of the House conclusively demonstrated that there are more than enough votes in the House to sustain the President's appeal.
