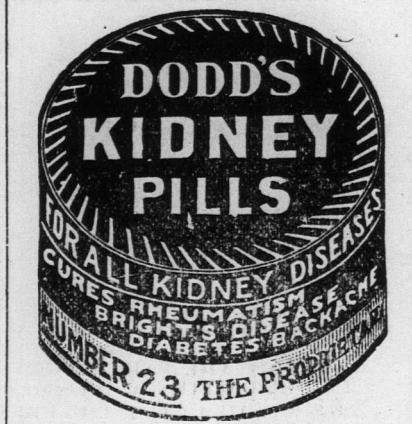
British Holders Sell U. S. Shares

London, Aug. 21.—According to estimates given to the World to-day by Lloyd's, brokers, between \$300,000,000 and \$500,000,000 worth of British securities have gone to America since the end of June. Many holders are anxious to invest their money in the British war loan. It has been roughly estimated by financiers in America that \$3,000,000,000 worth of American securities are held here.

There was better feeling apparent to-day in the city with regard to the exchange situation, which was attributable to the fact that the Government and bankers are conferring on the best methods to solve the problem. The World correspondent was told by one banking official that another sag may be expected, following the slight recovery.

It is the belief of many persons in the city that speculators in America have had an indirect influence in bringing it to a low level.

Representatives here of American financial institutions have not yet been participating in any conference with British officials.

On the other hand, so long as Germany affords such cases as those of the Lusitania, the Palaba, the Armenian, the Gulfight, the Orpington and the Iberian, our communications with that Empire will be invested with a peculiarly human interest, and the comparative calmness with which they are considered may be attributed to extraordinary self-restraint.

R. C. Citizens Meet

A large and representative gathering of R. C. citizens attended the meeting held in the Episcopal Library last evening to consider financial matters in connection with the Archdiocese. His Grace the Archbishop occupied the chair and Mr. M. A. Devine was appointed Secretary. His Grace after explaining the object of the meeting, which was to consider the formation of a finance committee, presented a full statement of the financial condition of the Archdiocese. He divided the amount of indebtedness under various heads, and the condition of affairs was most gratifying. During his remarks His Grace referred to the magnitude of the work done by his predecessor the late Archbishop Howley during whose Episcopate the Cathedral had undergone extensive repairs in the way of external and internal repairs, new ceiling, a new organ gallery, side galleries, hardwood floors, new pews and several other important improvements. The Sanctuary had been enlarged and the posthumous work of the late Archbishop the erection of a new marble altar rail, the gift of Mrs. Morris, sister of Archbishop Howley, had only recently been completed. He concluded by asking the assistance and co-operation of the laity.

Hon. Sir E. P. Morris thanked His Grace for the excellent and comprehensive manner in which he presented the affairs of the Archdiocese, and assured him of the united and earnest co-operation of the laity. He moved that a committee be appointed to act with the Archbishop in the matter. Mr. J. M. Kent was the first speaker. He seconded the resolution and endorsed all that the previous speaker had said, in a manner most complimentary to His Grace. On motion of Mr. J. Barron, seconded by Mr. J. L. Slattery, it was decided that the nomination of the committee be left to His Grace, who announced that he would consider the matter during the next few days and inform those selected by letter. The meeting adjourned at 9.15 p.m.
