"Sometime, if you think it worth the while," writes a letter friend, "I should like very much to have your opinion on the control of thoughts."

"Have you ever experienced the desire to rid your mind of a train of thought, which, although not wholly unwelcome, is foolish, and which has become almost an obsession? If so, you can understand what I mean. Perhaps there are mental exercises which could be used to help push out the undesirable thoughts. When one is much by one's self thoughts are an important factor, and if one's work is necessarily of a mechanical nature, not requiring great concentration, the mind will wander. The question is, 'Can a person train his or her mind to wander in pleasant, profitable, and character-forming paths?'"

Eyeballs But No Ear Lids

For some reason the Power that created us didn't see fit to give us ear lids to match our eyeballs. Likewise it failed to give us the ability to control our minds as easily as we do our bodies.

We have no forgettery to supplement our memory.

Isn't it weird to think that you can never say, "I will forget such and such a thing," and thereupon put it out of your mind for all time? You may not actively think of the painful occurrence, the unwelcome piece of knowledge, but it is somewhere in your brain and only death can entirely erase it. Nay, who knows if even death will wipe the slate quite clean?

"Push Out" Is Good
Nevertheless, though we cannot teach the sub-conscious mind to forget, we can control our conscious thoughts to some extent.

My letter friend says, "Perhaps there are mental exercises which could be used to push out the undesirable thoughts."

"Push out" is good. That is the way to get rid of anything evil. Don't just try to throw it out with an effort of the will. Push it out with something good. Nature abhors a vacuum, you know. If your mind wanders in unprofitable paths, find it paths that will profit.

Exercise Your Mind Muscles
Read up or talk over with people you meet the arguments on both sides of big questions, preparedness, socialism, prohibition, etc., and think them over.

Teach yourself to think, instead of dreaming. Don't let your mind wander vaguely from point to point. Teach it to pursue a train of thought. Strengthen it by using your thought muscles. For instance, if you can almost think of a quotation, control your mind until it quite gets it.

And now a word of warning—don't do any of these things too much. Be able to control your mind, but don't control it too rigidly, especially at first. Let it wander some of the time. All work and no play hurts minds as well as bodies. And a tired mind is a great deal harder to rest than a tired body.


