that the estimates for the current fiscal year had been overdrawn and that monies had been spent on contingency and other accounts without legislative sanction, and under other authority but that of Minutes of Council. This has been proven to be the case by no less a person than the Auditor General who in his report states that nearly all the departments had spent the monies voted them at last session of the House, by the end of February past, which means that they had actually exhausted their legitimate and authorised appropriations four months before the end of the financial year. The consequence of this is that for all other expenditure incidental to the carrying on of those departments which had outspent their votes, Minutes of Council had to be made, which had neither the approval of the Legislature or the warrant of the Auditor General. And in the face of this the Telegram was charged by the Hon. Minister of Finance, from his place in the House, with misrepresenting facts. The report of the Auditor General amply corroborates what we said under the caption of "Financial Juggling" in our issue of April 4th, and no other evidence is needed to prove the case against the Government.
