Koehn, of the Department of History, Reed College, Portland, Oregon, is published in the August number of "Current History." In the course of his writing Mr. Koehn says, "Many Americans, especially those who live on the Pacific Coast, view with uneasiness the renewal of the alliance in its present form. They regard this pact as inimical to the safety of the United States, and feel that if it should be renewed without change, British-American relations would be poisoned by mutual distrust and fear, and vitiated by a continuous anticipation of war." The fear of the East does not lend itself so much to the West, the people of which section do not see that there is a great cause for alarm in a closer tightening of Anglo-Japanese relations. But the East is obsessed with the idea that there is much to be alarmed at over the renewal of the alliance between Britain and Japan. They have developed the conviction that this alliance is against United States, and according to Mr. Koehn in-sist that such alliance is an ob-stacle to good relations between Britain and United States: first because it is conducted to bringing about a war between America and Japan: and secondly because in case of war England would be morally bound to come to the aid of her ally.
