The above statement was always be

lieved to be in accordance with fact, but it has now to give way to indisputable evidence taken from the epitaph on the tombstone, by Mr. George W. Bartlett, the enterprising merchant of Burin, a copy of which I give for the benefit of the readers of the Evening Telegram. Mr. Bartlett writes:

"These verses were deciphered from an old tombstone of the three Pardy brothers who perished in a snowstorn in the woods between Burin and Gar nish, 27th Feby., 1791.




