Editor "Wesleyan" Retires.

AFTER SIXTEEN YEARS LABOUR. Eight years ago the General Conference of the Methodist Church in the Maritime Provinces adopted a regulation which debarred a person over seventy years of age from holding a General Conference office; and this year, the worthy editor of the Wesleyan, Rev. D. W. Johnston, father of Rev. C. H. Johnson M.A., B.D., of Cochrane Street Centennial Church, St. John's, who is just a few days past the allotted term, gracefully bowed to the rule and will retire from the position which, during sixteen eventful years he has filled with eminent advantage to the church and the press and distinguished honor to himself. In a brief valedictory in the columns of the Wesleyan he assures its readers his eye is not dim nor his natural force abated, and that a day's tramp in the woods continues to be a joy; and that while he willingly obeys the law—as all good men should—he has no intention of sitting the bread of idleness and "will do some gleaming in the Master's fields."

The trenchant writing of the reverend and respected editor has done much to maintain and increase the prestige of the Wesleyan. His was at all times a work of love—and it was well done. The pity is that while still in the prime of the seventies, he is obliged to bow to the inexorable but well-intentioned law and make way for a younger man. He is to be succeeded by the Rev. Herbert F. Thomas, at present pastor of the Exmouth Church in St. John. The impression that Mr. Thomas has made on the work of the church gives assurance that the mantle of Rev. Johnston is falling upon worthy shoulders, and that under his guidance the Wesleyan will continue to be one of the prominent leaders of the religious press.

The Wesleyan was first issued from the press of William Cunnahell, in this city in February, 1858. The first attempt at an official Methodist publication had been made in 1832 by the issue of a quarterly magazine called "The Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Wesleyan Methodist Magazine;" but it was not favorably regarded by the London Missionary Association and was discontinued. The Wesleyan came after it; and has had a successful career under brilliant editors down to the retiring head, Rev. D. W. Johnston who, it will be hoped, has still many useful years of Service before him.—Halifax Herald.




