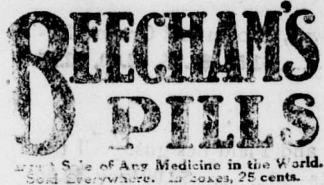

## TOWN COUNCIL.

Aylmer Tax Rate for 1916, 30 Mills—  
Dog By-law to be Enforced.

The regular monthly meeting of the  
Town Council was held on Monday  
evening, with all the members present  
but Councillor Laidlaw.

Councillor J. W. Allen, who was  
last month elected by acclamation,  
was present for the first time.

The minutes of the last meeting  
were read and adopted.

Mr. J. H. Strachan requested that  
the Council construct a drain on  
Chestnut Street, on which street he  
expects to build a residence. He was  
instructed to get a petition for same  
and bring it before the Council.

A report from the Underwriters'  
Association regarding the recent visit  
of the inspector to Aylmer was read.  
He recommended that hydrants be  
placed every 250 feet on Talbot Street.  
Now they range from 320 to 600 feet.  
It was too difficult for the firemen to  
open the hydrants, and he recom-  
mended they be made to open more  
easily.

A communication was read from the  
Board of Health, who recommended  
that a sewer be constructed to carry  
away the water from the cellars in  
the western part of the town, which  
was now a menace to the health of  
residents in that section.

The accounts as recommended by  
No. 1 Committee were then passed  
and ordered to be paid.

Walter E. Stewart, civil engineer, of  
this place, was appointed by By-law  
874, as town engineer.

By-law 875, to authorize the con-  
struction of an 8-inch glazed tile  
drain from St. Andrews Street to Park  
Street, in line with the present Cat-  
fish Creek and Park Street drain, as  
recommended by the Board of Health,  
was carried.

It was moved by McKenney and  
Little, that the assessment roll be re-  
ceived and a cheque for \$125 be issued  
for the assessor's salary. The total  
taxable assessment in Aylmer  
amounts to \$1,134,329. The roll showed  
Aylmer's population to be 2,271.

Aylmer's tax rate will be 30 mills  
on the dollar again this year.

Mr. Reavely asked for a rebate on  
the business assessment on the Gem  
Theatre, which was closed for repairs  
for some six months. This was laid  
over for further consideration.

That the Citizens' Band be furnis-  
hed to give music for the 24th of May  
celebration in Aylmer, was passed.  
The band gives the town one day's  
playing in return for the grant they  
receive from the Council.

Councillor Allen was placed on Nos.  
1 and 2 Committees, to succeed Mr.  
Albert Trim, who resigned.

Harry Emmett was appointed by  
by-law as dog pound-keeper for 1916.

The chairman of No. 3 Committee  
has given full power to secure a dog  
catcher.

It was moved that notices be pub-  
lished in the local papers, that on and  
after May 8th, 1916, the dog by-law  
be strictly enforced.

The Council passed a motion to in-  
struct all business men on the front  
street that their premises be cleaned  
up.

## MALAHIDE COUNCIL.

The Township Council met at the  
Town Hall here on Monday for their  
regular monthly session. All the  
members were present, and Reeve  
Pineo occupied the chair. The follow-  
ing motions were carried, and the  
following accounts ordered to be  
paid:

Roads and Bridges, \$839.15, which  
included payment for a new grader,  
\$225, and \$325.05 for iron to be used  
this year; refunds \$10; sheep protec-  
tion, \$18.50; John Street crossing  
gates, \$10.99; printing, \$20.

Moved by Hare, seconded by In-  
gram—That the engineer be author-  
ized to inspect and report upon the ad-  
visability of improving that portion  
of the road allowance north of the cor-  
poration line of Aylmer on the east  
side same to the 8th Concession.

Ingram-Chambers—That the Reeve  
and Coun. Hare be a committee op-  
posite Lot 8, between the 8th and 9th  
Concessions, to confer with the  
M. C. R.

Hare-Chambers—That Coun. Hill be  
a committee on road division No. 100,  
with power to act, also on road divi-  
sion No. 83, with power to act.

Ingram-Hill—That Coun. Chambers  
be a committee on 7th Concession,  
opposite Lot 22, with power to act.

Ingram-Hare—That Coun. Hill be a  
committee on Division 63, asked by  
W. Smithson.

Hill-Ingram—That Couns. Hare and  
Chambers be a committee on Division  
119, with power to act.

Chambers-Hare—That Couns. In-  
gram, Hill, and the Reeve be a com-  
mittee on Bayham Town line, with  
power to act.

Hare-Chambers—That the 27th day  
of May be set apart as a Court of Re-

vision on the assessment roll for the  
Township of Malahide for 1916; also  
a Court of Revision on the Gracey  
and Sinclair drains be held on this  
date at 10 a.m.

Hare-Ingram—That By-law No. 955  
known as Sinclair By-law, be pro-  
visionally adopted.

Hare-Chambers—That the engineer  
be authorized to inspect and report  
upon the advisability of improving  
that portion of the town line between  
Yarmouth and Malahide at a point  
north of the G. T. R., to the 8th Con-  
cession of Malahide or beyond.

Hare-Hill—That on complaint of  
Mr. George Foster that the outlet of  
Ferguson drain is out of repair, the  
Clerk notify the engineer to repair  
the same.

Chambers-Hare—That Gordon  
Smith be overseer on road Division  
119, in place of Anton Hipleh.

Hare-Hill—That the Reeve be au-  
thorized to get out notices and to  
serve the same on all parties inter-  
ested in the Stafford drain, to put  
their portions in repair according to  
the engineer's award on said drain.

Chambers-Ingram—That this Coun-  
cil do now adjourn until Monday, 5th  
June, at 10 a.m.
