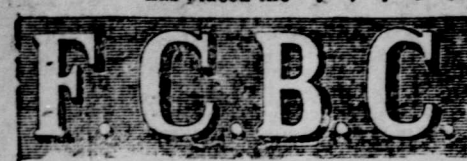

FINE WEATHER—WARMER.

Toronto, Aug. 31.—11 p.m.—The high pressure area mentioned yesterday covers the lake district, and extends throughout Ontario and Western Quebec, bringing fine, cool weather in these districts. The pressure is increasing in Eastern Canada, with fair weather. The low pressure area over Alberta yesterday is moving slowly across the Northwest and is now over Assiniboia, and is accompanied by warm weather and local showers.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Esquimaux, 54-64; Battleford, 45-72; Qu'Appelle, 36-74; Winnipeg, 32-66; Port Arthur, 38-62; Parry Sound, 42-56; Toronto, 50-68; Ottawa, 44-62; Montreal, 58-62; Quebec, 58-64; Halifax, 52-68.
