

A knife blade was then thrust into the back from slit to slit, and through the hole thus made a stick was thrust. The lariat led out from the back for a few feet and the ends were knotted together. At the knot one end of a single strand of the lariat was tied, and at the other end of it the head of a freshly slaughtered beef was attauched. In the published reports which I have seen on the incident reference is made to a buffalo head. There are no buffaloes in the southwest procurable for this or any other purpose. The Indian, with the dangling head dragging behind him, started from in front of the camp of Mesrs. Dorsey and Mooney and ran swiftly around the horseshoe. Supt. Seger, who had spent the night before with me, was there, and saw the Indian Mr. Seger started in pursuit, and although he came very close to the running man, he was unable positively to identify him. He undoubtedly was an Indian from Seger's colony, but he was so decked out in feathers and his face painted so grotesquely that Mr. Seger is not sure of his identity. is expected that in the race around the camp the stick will pull through the flesh. On this occasion, however, the dangling beef head was not heavy enough for this, or else the stick was too deeply set into the Indian's back, After he had made a single circuit of the camp he stopped and the strips of skin and flesh between the slits in the ndian's back were cut out.
