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HEAVY HAIL BEAT
DOWN THE GRAIN

Many Farmers in Westminster Suffer Heavy Loss by Saturday's Storm.

The rainstorm of Saturday afternoon was possibly the most severe of the present season.

The downpour began between 5 and 6 o'clock, and it continued unabated for over half an hour. So heavy was it that the sewer openings in the downtown district were not large enough to carry the water away, and in some places the walks were partly flooded. The storm was accompanied by a high wind, thunder and lightning, but not far as learned no buildings were struck.

To the south of the city the storm was much more severe. Throughout the township of Westminster the rain was accompanied by hail, so heavy that the grain in many fields was beaten flat, and acres of corn were also destroyed. Few if any of the farmers escaped, and in not a few instances the loss amounted to \$150 or \$200.

All along the line of the Grand Trunk east of the city, also on the C. P. R. as far as Toronto Junction, the storm was heavy. In the majority of places hail accompanied the rain, and the loss of the farmer was equally as bad as it was in Westminster.

CHEERS AS MEN DIE

Ten Drowned at a Regatta, But the Regatta Goes On.

Washington, Aug. 14.—Ten persons were drowned by the capsizing of a barge on the Potomac River, off Georgetown, the western section of this city, during the annual Potomac regatta. Four others who were on the barge escaped. All were fine swimmers, and the capsizing was the result of a tug-of-war between the barge and the shore, but miscalculated its course, and, striking the strong undertow caused by the mill-race, ran for a moment, and, as the passengers rushed to one side, turned turtle. Only a few of the thousands of people that lined the shore witnessed the accident. The police immediately set to work to recover the bodies. Many of the spectators, including officials of the district government, protested against the continuance of the regatta, in view of the tragedy, but the officials in charge declined to stop the sport, saying that it was inexpedient because people had come on from other cities to take part and that the regatta was the result of long-laid plans in which many outside interests were concerned. The cheering for the competing crews as they assailed the scene of the tragedy and the shrill and defiant wail of the pleasure craft, continued while the bodies of the unfortunate victims were being grappled for, dragged into view and sent to the police station.
