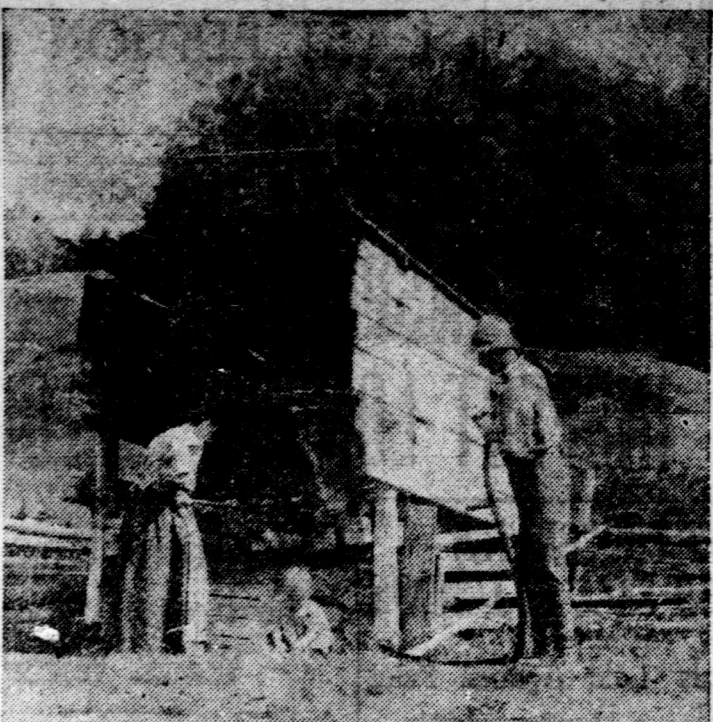




OLD-FASHIONED BAKE OVEN.

INCOME TAX PASSES BRITISH COMMONS

Henceforth Will Be a Part of Great Britain's Fiscal Machinery.

London, May 19.—The House of Commons last night, by a vote of 299 to 98, passed the budget's imposition of a 23-cent tax on unearned incomes and on incomes exceeding \$15,000; also the super tax of 12 cents upon incomes exceeding \$25,000 levied on the amount by which they exceed \$15,000.

In the course of the debate, Premier Asquith referred to the protest made by bankers against the budget. He pointed out that the bankers admitted the necessity of increased taxation to meet the increased expenditures. He challenged them to find a way that would be more equitable or less injurious to the country's trade. The Premier estimated the average income tax in Great Britain, including the super tax, at 23 cents, which, he said, he regarded as extremely moderate and less than that imposed in Germany and France. He fore-shadowed a further increase in the income tax, which he now regarded as a permanent part of Great Britain's fiscal machinery. He declared that with proper legislation and wise administration it would come to be considered the fairest of all taxes and capable of very wide expansion in time of public emergency.

DEATH OF MRS. BRADLEY

Well-Known Lady Passed Away at Home of Her Son, 265 Burwell Street.

Mrs. Mary Bradley, relict of the late John Bradley, died at the residence of her son, Mr. John G. Bradley, 265 Burwell street, yesterday, after a brief illness. Mrs. Bradley was 94 years old, and was a descendant of Mr. J. G. Bradley, who was born at Stoney Creek, and came to London 35 years ago. Ever since Wellington Street Methodist Church was built, Mrs. Bradley had been a member of it. She is survived by one sister, Mrs. Thomas Jones, of Forest; one brother, Mr. D. Galbraith, of Hamilton; a son, Mr. J. G. Bradley, of Burwell street, and one daughter, who lives in California. The funeral will be held on Friday afternoon from the residence of Mr. John G. Bradley to Mount Pleasant Cemetery, and the services will be conducted by Rev. H. A. Graham, of Wellington Street Methodist Church.

DROP FIGHT FOR PRESENT

Toronto Engineers Unable to Secure the Nine-Hour Day.

Toronto, May 19.—After a fight of over two years to establish a nine-hour working day, the machinists and amalgamated engineers of Toronto have given up the struggle, and have given permission to their members to work in any of the machine shops of the city. When the fight was commenced a large number of the small shops conceded the shorter work day, but the big shops resisted the demand of the union at the time.

A large number of men were out of employment, and consequently when the strikers vacated their positions, the unemployed machinists were only too glad to fill their places. The local officers, however, declare they have not given up hope of establishing the nine-hour day, and will wait for a more favorable opportunity to gain their concession for which they have been fighting.

TRAVERS WON AGAIN.

New York, May 19.—Jerome D. Travers, the American amateur golf champion, defeated Edward Blackwell by one hole at Mirfield today, and halved with H. D. Gillies in a three-ball match. This victory by Mr. Travers has greatly enhanced his reputation in the estimation of numerous golfers who are practicing here, preparatory to taking part in the championship contests that begin on May 25. Blackwell and Gillies are both first-class players. They contested in the final match with Walter J. Travis, when the latter won the British golf championship at Sandwich in 1904.

BENNETTS WILL NOT SAY ANYTHING

General Manager Was Very Reticent When Seen in Regard to Shubert Story.

COMPANY MAKING MONEY

But in This Regard Mr. Bennett Was Also Dumb—Talked of the Weather a Great Deal.

The story that the Bennett Enterprises had been approached to join forces with the Shuberts, in order to form another theatrical syndicate in Canada and the United States, as published in The Advertiser, has created a great deal of interest. Mr. C. W. Bennett, the general manager, was interviewed this afternoon, but would neither affirm nor deny the rumor. In fact, he would not discuss theatrical matters at all. He was extremely laud about the weather, but nothing further.

He would not confirm or deny the story emanating from the effect that the Bennett Enterprises had had a most successful year, clearing up over one hundred thousand dollars.

All Along the Line.

The business in Montreal and Ottawa was most satisfactory, the story related, while London, Hamilton and Quebec showed a good balance sheet, it is said. This line along the company determined on a change in policy. The war-time salaries made it somewhat difficult to obtain acts of sufficient merit at a reasonable salary to make it pay in the smaller cities, and it was decided to go into vaudeville and pictures.

This idea was dictated by sound business judgment, and as a result the most satisfactory returns have been received. Since that time, business has been excellent in all branches, and the record of the year has been most satisfactory.

More Rumors.

There are many rumors as to the extensive branching of the company into still larger fields, but no confirmation could be given the report.

Mr. Bennett admitted that he was satisfied with the season's business, but he would go no further.

When asked about the rumor that he had joined the Shuberts in an endeavor to form a theatrical circuit to Klaw & Erlanger, he refused to discuss the matter at all, saying that there was nothing whatever for publication.

"But a story from New York says that you have already gone in with the Shuberts, to play all of your theatres?" the reporter asked. "I told you I had absolutely nothing to say," Mr. Bennett replied, a little acridly. "When we have a statement to make, we will let the papers know."

MR. G. S. GIBBONS GIVES \$50 FOR FREE BATHS

Sum Received by the Playgrounds Committee at Meeting Yesterday.

A meeting of the Playgrounds Association to make arrangements for the opening of the playgrounds on the 24th of May was held in the city hall yesterday afternoon.

It was decided to put the apparatus on the grounds on Saturday, preliminary to the opening of the grounds on the holiday. Mr. Fraser reported that the time would be turned before that time, and Mr. Edwards notified the association that the baseball games had been provided for. There will be six games if conditions will permit. The question of opening the sulphur baths for the use of juveniles, both boys and girls, under the same regulations as last year, was discussed at length. The board was rejoiced to hear of a donation of \$50 that had been received from Mr. George S. Gibbons to the playgrounds. It was stated at a previous meeting that the probable cost of the free baths would be \$8 a week. It is now known that the board determined to appeal to the generosity of the people of London, and in the meantime the baths will be conducted as long as the gift presented by Mr. Gibbons lasts, in the hopes that other citizens will feel impelled to follow his example.

A report on the opening of another free bath in the southwest part of the city. Prof. Butterworth, the swimming expert, had previously recommended the site. It was estimated that the bath could be opened if an initial amount of \$250 would be guaranteed.

The question of opening another playground in East London was also considered. It was thought that \$250 would be sufficient to start the project, could readily be subscribed in the neighborhood. Steps will be taken to ascertain the wishes of the people in that locality.

WARD FOUR SHOWS A POPULATION GAIN

But It Is Only an Increase of 44 on an Assessment Office Census.

The population of Ward 4 shows a net gain of 44 for the year. Assessment Commissioner Grant has finished his assessment of that ward, and states that the population this year is 14,450.

Last year the population was 14,406, an increase of 44 on the roll. The real increase is more than that, however. Since the census was taken in 1908, the force at Wolsley Barracks has decreased 144 men, there being only 93 men there, as compared with 237 a year ago.

The population fluctuates a little at this time, said Mr. Grant. "There may be more than that in a little time. Of course the real increase is more than the figures show. The barracks has decreased 144 men, reduced nearly 150, so that we would have about 200 more than in 1908, if the soldiers had not been transferred."

Each nurse took this pledge, and was then presented by the chairman with her diploma, and a handsomely bound book. The booklets were presented amid enthusiastic applause. A harp solo rendered by Mr. Angelo Cortese was greatly enjoyed.
