HON. JAS. M'SHANE

Montreal, Jan. 25.—Hon. James

BANANA KING DEAD
Sale of Fruit.
London, Jan. 25.—Sir Alfred Jones,
K. C. M. G., who died in Liverpool
recently, was one of England's great-
est financiers and business men. His
rise was meteoric. He was born in
Carmarthen 33 years ago, and be-
gan his career as a strong life as
an office boy with Messrs. Laird,
Fletcher & Co., the managers of the
African Steamship Company, at the
provincial wage of half a crown a
week.

Small pay and much work were his
lot for many years, but eventually he
became manager of the firm, and re-
mained so until the owners deter-
mined to retire. Then he took an of-
fice as a shipping broker, and in 1879
he joined the firm of Elder, Dempster
& Co., as junior partner. Since then
his life had been bound up with the
story of this firm. When he joined
it owned 20 ships, a fleet which
today has increased to over a hun-
dred steamers, which are to be seen
in almost all parts of the world.

One of the greatest feats of the
firm was its exploitation of the ba-
nana trade of the West Indies and
Canary Island, and the part which
Sir Alfred took in this was for him
the title of "Banana King."

It is no exaggeration to say that he
rescued the Canaries from destruction
by his recognition of the possibilities
of banana culture. He induced the
naturally indolent natives to cultivate
the fruit, and organized the trade in
them and shipped them to England.

DE LA RONDE ACQUITTED
Ottawa, Jan. 25.—The charges
against Ottawa's chief of police, Major
S. E. De La Ronde, for alleged irregu-
larities in his military capacity, were
heard today. The first charge was
that of falsifying the pay sheets of
the 1st Battalion of the 2nd Canadian
Corps, while at the Quebec garrison.
On this Major De La Ronde was
acquitted. It was shown that the pay
sheets were signed and checked paid
to his son, Capt. De La Ronde.
