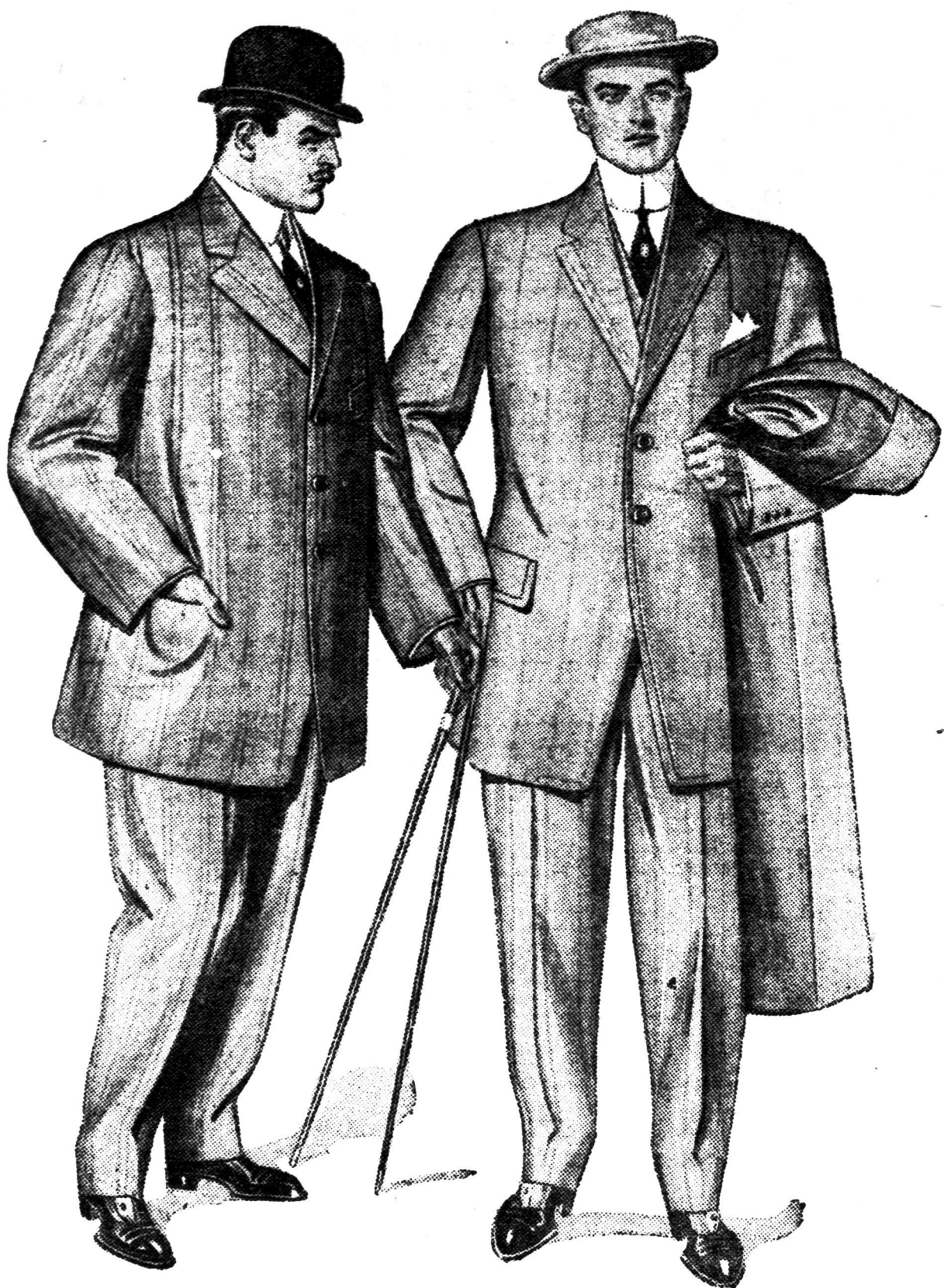

2,000 WALK OUT.

Philadelphia, March 9.—The ranks of the general strikers who quit work in sympathy with the carmen were swelled this afternoon by a walkout of 2,000 workmen from the Baldwin Locomotive Works.
"I admit that between 1,000 and 2,000 men struck at 1 o'clock," said S. M. Vaucian, one of the heads of the works. "The feeling of the men was due to the prevailing strike excitement. They will soon be back."
After the men quit they formed a procession and marched to Labor Lyceum Hall, where they were addressed by union leaders.

MILITARISM A CURSE TO NATION

Mr. Geo. C. Gibbons, K. C., So Informed His Hearers at Engineer's Banquet Last Night.

NO WAR WITH GERMANY

If Germany Did Send 300,000 Men Here Not One of Them Would Leave the Dominion Alive.

The third annual banquet of the members of London Lodge, No. 30, of the Canadian Association of Stationary Engineers, held in the Masonic Temple, last night, proved a most enjoyable gathering, and was considerably larger than any that have been held in the past, as a large number of guests were present from neighboring cities and towns.
Mr. D. P. Campbell, who presided, extended a warm welcome to all the guests, particularly to the large number of ladies present. He was glad also, he said, to see so many engineers from Stratford, St. Thomas and other places.

Mr. George C. Gibbons, K. C., in replying to "Canada," made the speech of the evening.

"I feel greatly honored to be with you this evening," said Mr. Gibbons, "and congratulate you on your splendid banquet. The skilled mechanic and the farmer are the backbone of this country. When you want to get it among the businessmen; but when you want a fair view you get it from the farmers and mechanics. Every nation is just what its people make it. You hear a great deal about the Germans. The foresight of their people has brought about the splendid system of technical education they have. This makes good citizens and good people. It is better to have one man who takes a pride in his work than ten who do not. Character makes a nation, and a nation makes a character."

"We in Canada are in a peculiar position. We have been living at peace with our neighbors for nearly a hundred years now, and I hope it may continue so."

The Beginning of Wars.
"Wars do not come from people who work, but from idle people. That is why I think there will be no war with Germany. They are all workers there, and are industrious, and do not want war. If 300,000 Germans were to land in Canada tomorrow, however, I do not think one would ever leave it alive. We would fight shoulder to shoulder for our country, and men and women would die for her."

"I think we have a splendid system of law, splendidly administered. What we want is a people noted for their high ideals, their industry and their desire to do right by other nations. Everybody in this country and the world over should try to stifle the spirit of antagonism. It is not in the interests of a nation to fight. If the spirit that ought to prevail actually

prevailed, nagging with out neighbors to the south would cease."

"If England, the United States, and Germany were to get together they can rule the world, and I believe such an arrangement will result sooner or later."

"If two men fight, they are hauled into a court and fined. Why should there not be a court for nations, who have differences, and the horrors of war be done away with?"

"I believe it will not be long before such a state of affairs will be brought about."

The Cause of Militarism.
"Every time I return from Europe, I thank God that here in Canada we have not the curse of militarism. A standing army is a menace to the people. We want men to talk peace, and such men will build up our country. We want men such as stationary engineers to come to our country, with their wives and families."

Mayor Beattie.
"Boosting seems to be in the very air here now," said Mayor Beattie, who responded to the toast to "The City." "That is a good thing. Unfortunately we have some who are 'knockers' and who are ready to find fault with everything. Unfortunately, too, through the press these reports reach outsiders, and while not believed here, are often believed outside. Kickers do not seem to see that in pursuing a policy of this kind they are injuring themselves. We do not, I think, devote enough time to technical education. This is an important matter."

"Closing the Door," Etc.

Speaking of the reports that had appeared regarding the cruelty in connection with killing dogs at Queen's, the mayor said he did not know whether they were true or not.

"I assure you, though," he said, "proper precautions have been taken to prevent any possible repetition of such things in future."

"Our organization," was responded to by President Charles Kelly, who warmly congratulated the members of London Lodge, No. 30, on having such a splendid banquet.

"We are organized," he said, "for a noble purpose, the education of all our members."

Board of Trade.
President A. T. McMahon, in responding to the "Board of Trade," said he was formerly a stationary engineer. He thought every man should get an education out of his work while doing it.

"Nothing," he said, "can keep London back. We are backed by a good country and have good people. We should be boosters."

Mr. F. E. Leonard replied to the toast to "The Manufacturers," urged the need of more technical education, particularly for the young men. "The economy of gas engines, he stated, is now the great rival of steam and electricity, and its efficiency is unquestioned. He advocated special training in future for gas, steam and electrical engineers in order that those who are to follow may be saved much time and trouble."

"Our trade schools must be increased," he said, and more apprentices should be taken in factories. Mrs. H. Leonard suggested that the minister of education furnish books on engineering for all who need them.

The Ladies' was responded to by Principal Radcliffe, of the Normal School, and in the course of his remarks he spoke in favor of women being granted the franchise.
