Hay Miller and Fred Whitcroft are in the west and the Patricks are both at the coast. There may be developments within the next few weeks, but Renfrew can have any of the above mentioned they desire. Hogan, of Quebec, and Fraser, the Arnprior boy, are not likely to be taken on again.

It is understood that the Renfrew club intend trying out Louis Imbleau, the star wing man of the Rangers. It has been rumored that the Renfrew team will include Albert Kerr and Marty Walsh, of the Ottawas. Negotiations have not yet been entered into, however, and it is not likely that the Renfrew officers would care to break the residence rule which the National Association has incorporated in its constitution.

FIXING REFEREES' FEES

Rev. F. W. Armstrong, of Trenton,
Suggests Strong Measure in Re-
ference to Deliberate
Rough Tactics.

Toronto, Nov. 9.—The O. H. A. annual convention, which will be held in the Temple Building at 9 a.m. Saturday, the 19th, will have plenty of subjects for discussion, judging by the notices of amendments issued today by Secretary W. A. Hewitt.

James T. Sutherland, of Kingston, suggests that the 20-year maximum age limit be retained in the junior series. It will be remembered that at the last annual meeting the age limit was reduced to 19 years, the same to be in effect this year. Mr. Sutherland wants the old order of things to continue, and will find many supporters throughout the province, as the junior series, under the 20-year rule, has been one of the most successful in the association.

Birth Certificates.
J. Ross Robertson has put in a useful amendment, compelling all junior players to furnish official birth certificates, instead of statutory declarations by parents. Last year's experience of the sub-committee proved the necessity for a change. Norman White, of Port Rowan, formerly of Grimsby, has a suggestion of amendments. One is to allow only one representative on the executive from any one town or city. This is aimed at the Toronto members, but the work of the association could not be done without the sub-committee. Mr. White also desires to prevent players who have signed intermediate certificates from playing any junior games, another practical suggestion. He also advocates the use of two referees in semi-final games.

Referees' Fees Fixed.
A. T. Kinder, of Preston, wants the fees for referees fixed as follows: \$5 and actual expenses for junior \$5 and actual expenses for intermediate, and \$7 and where a local man acts, when it shall be \$5 in all three series.

\$10,000 MONUMENT

Tips to the Amateur Chauffeur

The use of an ammeter in connection with a gasoline motor is to show the amount of current which the coil is drawing in operation and to test the condition of dry cells. A coil should not draw more than 3 to 5 amperes with engine running, and if the motor will not run steadily with this amount of ignition current either the vibrator or the space between the poles of the spark plugs generally needs adjustment.

To insure economic operation, first procure a low reading ammeter of more than 3 or 4 amperes. Next, detach the lead wire of the battery, preferably the ground wire, and place the instrument in circuit; that is, one pole of the instrument should be connected to the detached wire and the other to the battery where the wire was attached. Turn on the battery switch and start the engine and the ammeter will show the amperage the coil is drawing. In the case of the feed pipe, circuit see that the current flows in the needle from left to right. If the needle does not do this, reverse the contacts of the instrument. This also applies to testing dry cells. Never use an ammeter on a storage battery.

The little chips which are mounted on the outer ends of the long leaves in semi-elliptical springs should be kept drawn up tight and firmly secured at all times. Their office is to prevent the leaves from getting out of alignment and to act as shock absorbers by bringing the outer leaves into the space between the leaves, as well as by increasing the friction between the leaves.
