WORLD'S RECORD BROKEN IN  
DISCUSS-THROWING EVENTTaipale, of Finland, Won the  
Final With a Tremendous  
Throw—Other Results.

Stockholm, July 12.—The seventh day of the athletic section of the Olympic games opened this morning, with the prospect of providing a more interesting session than that of yesterday. Most delightful weather conditions continued to prevail.

Very early this morning a large group of big men, those from the northern nations forming the majority, gathered for the finishing rounds of the discuss-throwing contest, best hand. Shortly afterwards the 90 runners entered for the 400-metres flat race turned out to compete in the 15 heats of that event, the semi-final heats of which were also set for decision today.

The judges decided not to have the men run in laps as in the final in London in 1908. The 3,000-metres team race, also run in heats, the final of the 110-metres hurdle race, the running long jump, and the 4,000-metres cross-country run, starting and finishing in the stadium, which is the concluding event of the modern pentathlon, gave great variety to the programme.

The correspondent here of a London newspaper in his dispatches accused the American runners of unfair play against Hans Braun, the German athlete in the final of the 800-metres flat race. He described them as "pocketing" Braun. The Germans on the contrary say that the race was perfectly fair, and Braun himself made no protest.

The morning started with a fine performance by the Finn, A. R. Taipale, in the discuss-throwing, best hand, final. He beat with his throw of 45 metres, 21 centimetres (147 feet, 1 1/4 inches), not only the Olympic record of 136 feet, 1-3 inch, made by Sheridan in Athens in 1906, but also the world's record of 145 feet, 9 1/2 inches, established by James H. Duncan at Celtic Park on June 2, this year. R. L. Byrd's throw of 42 metres, 32 centimetres (138 feet, 8 1/2 inches), also exceeding the standing Olympic record.

RALPH CRAIG WON  
THE 200 METRES RACE

Michigan Runner Shows His Heels to  
Some of World's Best Sprinters.

Stockholm, July 11.—The final of the 200 metres flat race belonged to Ralph C. Craig, Detroit, almost from the beginning. Donald F. Lippincott, United States, broke away ahead at the start, but Craig soon passed him. The German, Rau, and the Englishman, W. R. Applegarth, had a good fight for third place. Rau led the Briton until they had reached the home-stretch. In the last few yards, Craig and Applegarth were closely bunched, and there was a great struggle to the tape. Craig broke it, however, over a yard ahead of Lippincott.

The Briton and the German were just behind Lippincott's elbow. Applegarth having about a foot lead, Craig was comparatively fresh after the race. Rau had done his utmost, but found the company too fast for him, and was badly exhausted.

Of the six semi-final heats in the 110-metres hurdles race, five were won by members of the United States team. The other semi-final was won by K. Powell, England, who will be the only athlete to oppose the Americans in the final heat tomorrow, as the winners only of the semi-finals are qualified to participate.

"KID GRIFFO" PINCHED  
FOR BEGGING ON STREET

New York, July 11.—Albert Griffith, known in the pugilistic world as "Kid Griffio," and for several years the light-weight champion of Australia, was arrested here early today charged with soliciting alms. The former champion, shabbily dressed and hungry, was lined up at the station-house before Sergeant Sheridan, who knew him well in his palmy days, and recognized him despite the 200 pounds of flesh which concealed his once athletic frame.

"Fifteen years ago," said Sheridan, "I met Griffith used to bet a thousand dollars that no one could knock a cigar from his mouth while he stood on a handkerchief. He didn't step off the bit of cloth, and he didn't strike a blow. He merely dodged, and always won his bet."

"His first fight in this country was for a purse of \$4,000 at the Broadway Athletic Club. He won, and the cashier brought him a big roll of greenbacks—three one-thousand-dollar bills. He couldn't read or write, and had never seen any of those bills of larger denomination. He was glad to get the one-dollar bills, but didn't want the others. The crowd tried to persuade him to take them, but couldn't so 'Griffo' walked off with the hundred one-dollar bills and left the rest, \$3,300."
