

CHAS. A. MASSEY SHOT BY SERVANT

Grandson of Founder, of Massey-Harris Co., Is Killed.

GIRL ALLEGES ADVANCES

Calmly Faces Employer and Empties Two Revolver Chambers at Him.

(Special to The Advertiser.)

TORONTO, Feb. 8.—Charles A. Massey, grandson of the late H. A. Massey, founder of the Massey-Harris Company, was shot to death on the steps of his residence, 159 Waverley road, this evening by Carrie Davies, a domestic employed in the place. The shooting occurred shortly after 6 o'clock as Mr. Massey was ascending the steps after purchasing a paper from a passing newsboy.

Mr. Massey was head of the York Motor Car Company. His wife is at present traveling in the United States and is either in Hartford or New York City.

Said Massey Made Approaches.

The story told to the police by the girl is sensational. She explained that Massey made approaches to her in her room on Sunday evening last and when she refused to yield he left the room. When he was coming towards the house he met the newsboy. Massey, leaving the place, the girl stood in the doorway and as Mr. Massey tried to cross the threshold, she fired two shots. The first went wide, the second penetrated the left breast.

He cried "Oh!" and made a dash for the sidewalk and collapsed in front of a neighbor's house. He was carried in and expired ten minutes without another word.

Lying on Veranda.

The noise of the shot attracted neighbors, who came out and found Massey lying on his veranda. He was carried into a nearby house and the police were notified. When they reached the place, men were stationed at the front and rear doors, and Sgt. Brown entered the house. He found Massey's 14-year-old son in the basement, attending to the furnace, entirely unaware of what had happened. With the policeman, he went upstairs, and the officer called to the girl, who was in the attic.

Girl Taken With Weapon.

"Come up," he called, but she decided to go up. The girl met him at the head of the stairs with the revolver in her hand. She was partly dressed for the street and did not know whether she would go to her sister or the police station. Mrs. Massey, who lives at 159 Waverley road, Bridgeport, Conn. He was a son of Charles A. Massey, one time vice-president and general manager of the Massey Manufacturing Company, and later director of the Massey-Harris Company. According to the police, the girl was asked, among other things, to don tight.

Man and Wife Held On Charge of High Treason

Grand Jury Finds True Bill Against Husband—Released on \$150,000 Bail.

TORONTO, Feb. 8.—At the criminal session this afternoon the grand jury found a true bill against Emil Nerlich, who was recently committed to the police court on a charge of high treason in assisting an alien enemy to leave the country, and was released on \$100,000 bail. He is held with his wife on bench warrants. They appeared in court this afternoon, and were released on \$150,000 bail.

The trial will probably commence on February 12.

When Mr. Nerlich was arrested by Detective Armstrong and County Constable John Brown, he was entering a kitchen on Front street, just opposite the Union Station. He was immediately taken to the assizes court by the officers.

BRITAIN KNOWS NO MEXICAN PRESIDENT

Damage to British Interests Cited in United States.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—The foreign office, replying today to questions in the House of Commons, said the British Government had not recognized anybody as president of Mexico since the retirement of General Victoriano Huerta. He added, however, that the Government had brought to the attention of the United States several cases of damages and loss to British interests in Mexico, which occurred since the ex-president's departure from the country in July of last year.

ITALIANS MAY REVOLT UNLESS GOVERNMENT TAKES PART IN WAR

(Canadian Press.)

ROME, Feb. 8.—(240 p.m.)—A royal decree orders that the soldiers of the "Red" category, classes of 1838 and 1844, who should have returned home, shall now be retained under the colors until May 31, 1915. A royal decree issued today prohibiting the exportation of fresh or preserved pork and other preserved meat, chestnuts, fowl, oil, fat and lard. This decree, with the former royal decree prohibiting the exportation of certain other goods, completes the ban on the exportation of anything which might be used as food for man or beast.

PADEA, Italy (via Rome), Feb. 8.—(240 p.m.)—Delegates of political clubs and associations of several senators and members of the Chamber of Deputies, who are favorable to Italy entering the war on the side of the Allies, met here today and headed an imposing procession of persons who laid wreaths on the royal decree prohibiting exports.

At a meeting later, resolutions were passed urging Italy's intervention in the war and also calling for the completion of national unity for social progress, the betterment of political and commercial life, and for the dissolution of the triple alliance.

The Republican group passed a resolution that the people will take course in a revolution if the Government will not take part in the war. Other political factions dissented from the resolution.

WANTS INVESTIGATION

ROME, Feb. 8.—(2:55 p.m.)—Deputy Altobelli, in a formal interpellation in the chamber of deputies today, asked Premier Salandra to ascertain the foundation for "the grave reports circulating concerning the illicit interference by an ambassador of a foreign power in the foreign life of our country, with a view to obtaining a change in our foreign policy."

The deputy asked further that if the premier's reply was in affirmation of the report that the ambassador had been engaged in such a propaganda, what action the premier intended to take to protect the dignity of the Italian state.

LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR OF QUEBEC IS DEAD

Sir Francois Langelier Succumbs to Month's Illness—Knighthood by King Edward in 1907.

QUEBEC, Feb. 8.—Sir Francois Langelier, lieutenant-governor of Quebec, died this afternoon at his official residence, Spencerwood. His honor, who was born at St. John's, Nfld., has been ill for some months. His duties during the past month have been assumed by Sir Horace Archibald, acting lieutenant-governor. Sir Francois was a Liberal and free-trader. He resigned his seat in Parliament to become a judge of the superior court of the province. He was knighted by the late King Edward in 1907, and appointed lieutenant-governor in 1911.

IS GERMAN FLEET GETTING READY FOR IMPORTANT FIGHT?

All Telegraph Communication With Danzig Is Now Cut Off.

LONDON, Feb. 9.—(3:10 a.m.)—The Daily Mail's Copenhagen correspondent considers significant the fact that since the outbreak of the war, telegraphic communication with Danzig (near the mouth of the Vistula River and bordering on the Baltic Sea) has ceased. Danzig is a base of a great part of the German fleet and all the neutral steamers living in the harbor there have been prohibited from sending out telegrams or letters. All telegraphic communication with Danzig also has been stopped, according to the correspondent.

WANTS NEUTRALS TO GET TOGETHER

Senator LaFollette Introduces Resolution in White House.

NEUTRALS LOST CHANCE

Should Have Protested Violations Early in Present War.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—An international conference of representatives of neutral nations to discuss means of ending the European war, to establish neutral trade routes at sea and propose the ultimate creation of an international tribunal for the establishment of world peace, was proposed in a resolution in the Senate today by Senator LaFollette.

Earl Grey Speaks.

LONDON, Feb. 8.—(10:20 p.m.)—Earl Grey, president of a conference today to advocate an agreement among nations for the enforcement of international law, said that the present conflict would probably never have taken place had the policy of American pacifists, that the signatory nations to The Hague convention should undertake collective responsibility for the enforcement, been adopted.

Neutrals Last Opportunity.

"It is almost too late," said Earl Grey, "that this logical and necessary conference of The Hague tribunal will be adopted when the nations again meet in consultation. The neutral powers who signed The Hague conventions missed a great opportunity by not protesting against the violations of the international regulations which occurred in this war, which undoubtedly would have led to a diminution of its horrors."

A resolution was passed declaring it to be imperative that a peace be established, which shall secure collective responsibility by all civilized nations for the maintenance and enforcement of international law.
