WINDSOR RACE TRACKS
TO BE REPAIRED
FOR POSSIBLE MEETS

Meeting of Parliament and Verdict Will Signalize Activities At Border Tracks.

WINDSOR, Jan. 15.—While no actual work has been commenced in preparing the three race tracks here for a resumption of the "sport of kings" this summer, local officials of the Windsor Jockey, Kenilworth and Devonshire Clubs are confident meets will again be in order by the pari-mutuel betting system. As meets do not open here until the summer, men have not yet been placed on the grounds, but work will probably be commenced during the latter part of February or early in March, after the meeting of Parliament, and an official and definite pronouncement made, local officials declared today.

MANY TILLSONBURG FANS
WILL ACCOMPANY TEAM

Pan-Drieds Expect to Win Game Tonight Which Will Give Them Group Lead.

TILLSONBURG, Jan. 14.—Local hockey fans have been making great efforts to run a special train to London Friday evening, but the guarantee is prohibitive. Nevertheless, a good big crowd of fans will accompany the kids to cheer them to the victory they fully expect to obtain, and there is practically no doubt here that the Junior Pan-Drieds will be on the big end of the score with London, and if such proves to be the case, Tillsonburg will practically have group honors clinched. Paris has defeated all remaining games, leaving Tillsonburg in the lead with five games won, one lost and two to play. London has won four, lost one and three to play.

Tillsonburg will use practically the same line-up that handed London their Waterloo here on Monday evening, and being in the pink of condition, London will have to travel some to get away with a win on Friday.

ATHLETES ADMIT ROBBERY.
Calgary, Jan. 15.—The deliberateness with which Ted Dollingham and Gordon McTeer, two Calgary athletes, planned attack and robbery against Jeff Cruickshank, a local taxi man, but instead battered up Walter Ashdown, a chauffeur employed by Cruickshank, has been freely admitted by McTeer. He said that Dollingham told him it would be a simple matter to put Cruickshank away once they got him out of the city a piece, and they could then relieve him of a good-sized roll which he was known to carry.

SMALLPOX INCREASING
THROUGHOUT ONTARIO

Disease Has Made Its Appearance in 24 New Centres.

TORONTO, Jan. 15.—Smallpox is increasing through the province, according to a report from Dr. J. McCullough, provincial officer of health, this morning. Comparing the 1433 cases reported in December with reports of 597 received during the first ten days of January he sees cause for anxiety. In December there were two deaths from smallpox. Thus far in January there have been five. The disease is reported to have broken out in 24 new centres.

IN AGONY, PRISONER
CONFESSES BRUTAL
MURDER AT SYDNEY

Sydney, N. B., Jan. 15.—Awakened by agonizing screams, County Jailor Karna at midnight was called to the cell of Mike Koval, who has been detained for some weeks on suspicion of being concerned in the brutal Marinello murder here on Christmas Eve.

Koval declared that he could hold out no longer and overcome by terror he confessed to the killing of Marinello at the instance of his brother, who threatened him with death if he should falter in the execution of the plan. The authorities have announced the fact of the confession, but are keeping back the details of the crime for the present.

HOUSE MAY AGAIN
MEET IN MUSEUM;
BUILDING NOT READY

OTTAWA, Jan. 15.—The approaching session of Parliament may be held in the national museum and not in the new Parliament Buildings, as announced some time ago. At any rate there is a considerable degree of uncertainty about the matter at the present time.

Members of Parliament who have been in the capital this week and who have inspected the new buildings, have expressed the view that it would be better for Parliament to hold another session in the museum. Officials of the House of Commons have been advised
