St. Thomas, April 11.—The London boys won three out of the four boxing bouts in the armories here this evening. The show was staged under the auspices of the sergeants' mess, First Elgin Regiment, and was the last of the season. A record crowd was in attendance.

The first bout was in the 100-pound class, and Clifford Smith of London had the better of the argument with Bill de Hart, St. Thomas. Both boys were a little shy at first, but became better acquainted as the match progressed.

In the second round Smith had De Hart tottering with rights to the head, but the St. Thomas youth lasted the three rounds. Smith had the edge in the whole bout.

Dan McInnis of London and Serg. North of the Railroad City fought three rounds to draw in the second bout. Both had the habit of clinching at critical stages of the game, although a few healthy swats were exchanged in the last frame.

Dave Smith, a London 125-pounder, had Ross Schraeder groggy in the first round of their three-round affair, knocking him down with three rights to the jaw. Tommy Wallace wanted to stop the bout in the second round, but the boy was game and stuck it out.

J. Willis won his bout with St. Poole of St. Thomas by a small margin. Willis rocked Poole in the first round with a right to the head, but eased up a little after that.

Bobby Bell and Billy Bushel, two young proteges of Tommy Wallace, gave three rounds of exhibition work. Although Bobby is only 12 years old, he could show some of the old timers a few tricks. It is very doubtful if his equal at his age can be found in Canada, and Tommy Wallace hopes to make a champion out of him some day.

Billy, who is 10 years of age, is a clever kid, and should develop into a first-rate boxer.
