London, Sept. 19—Late reports yesterday indicated that the uprising in Trans-Jordania is more serious than was indicated by the official statement covering the situation, says a Jerusalem despatch to the Daily Mail. The movement involves two native tribes and about 15,000 troops. The British government has issued an official report from Jerusalem under McKay's date in which the trouble Was explained. It added that the Trans-Jordanian forces had dispersed the tribesmen, killing about 30 men. The statement said the trouble "probably" had ended.

Sudbury, Sept. 19—"Potato-apples" is the name officially applied by the Ontario College of Agriculture to the tomato-like product which a resident of this district found growing in quantities on the tops of his potato plants. The double growth was the result of "black scurf" disease, say the college experts, and is often developed in a wet season. recent cold spell has had a very deleterious effect on the grape crop. according to a statement made by J. R. Montgomery, manager of the Niagara District Grape Growers, Limited, the selling organization of the grape growers, who stated that the crop will not now be more than 55 per cent of the grape crop of last year. The company at present is very short of grape. to the cool weather preventing proper maturity of the fruit, and also to the breaking of contracts by the growers.
