

VEGETABLE SALAD

ONE of the reasons that many people do not serve salad is that the family does not like oil. Another reason is that one does not

always have lettuce and most recipes for salad call for lettuce. The following recipe uses very little oil and no lettuce: 2 green peppers cut in small cup shredded cabbage

1 cup celery cut in small pieces cucumbers, pared and cut in very small pieces (or they

may be chopped) tomatoes, chopped 1 red pepper, fresh or canned

3 tablespoons oil Mix all the ingredients in a bowl thoroughly, and serve very cold. If you do not have celery use twice as much cabbage and add one-fourth teaspoon celery salt.


