

RESERVES JUDGMENT IN SUIT FOR DAMAGES

Judge Macbeth Expected To
Visit Scene of Ac-
cident.

Judgment was reserved late yesterday afternoon by Judge Macbeth in the \$392 county court damage action brought by Henry Johnston against the London Street Railway. Mr. Johnston charged the street car was going at an excessive rate of speed and that the motorman was negligent.

David L. Martin, a motorman for the street railway, claimed Johnston told him after the accident that he (Johnston) was going so fast he couldn't stop when he saw the street car. This statement was denied by Johnston.

C. B. King, manager of the street railway, stated the car was laid up three or four weeks for repairs and stood the company a loss of \$10 a day net.

Judge Macbeth will visit the scene of the accident before giving judgment, he intimated.

F. H. Curran appeared for Mr. Johnston, while J. C. Elliott, K.C., acted for the defence.

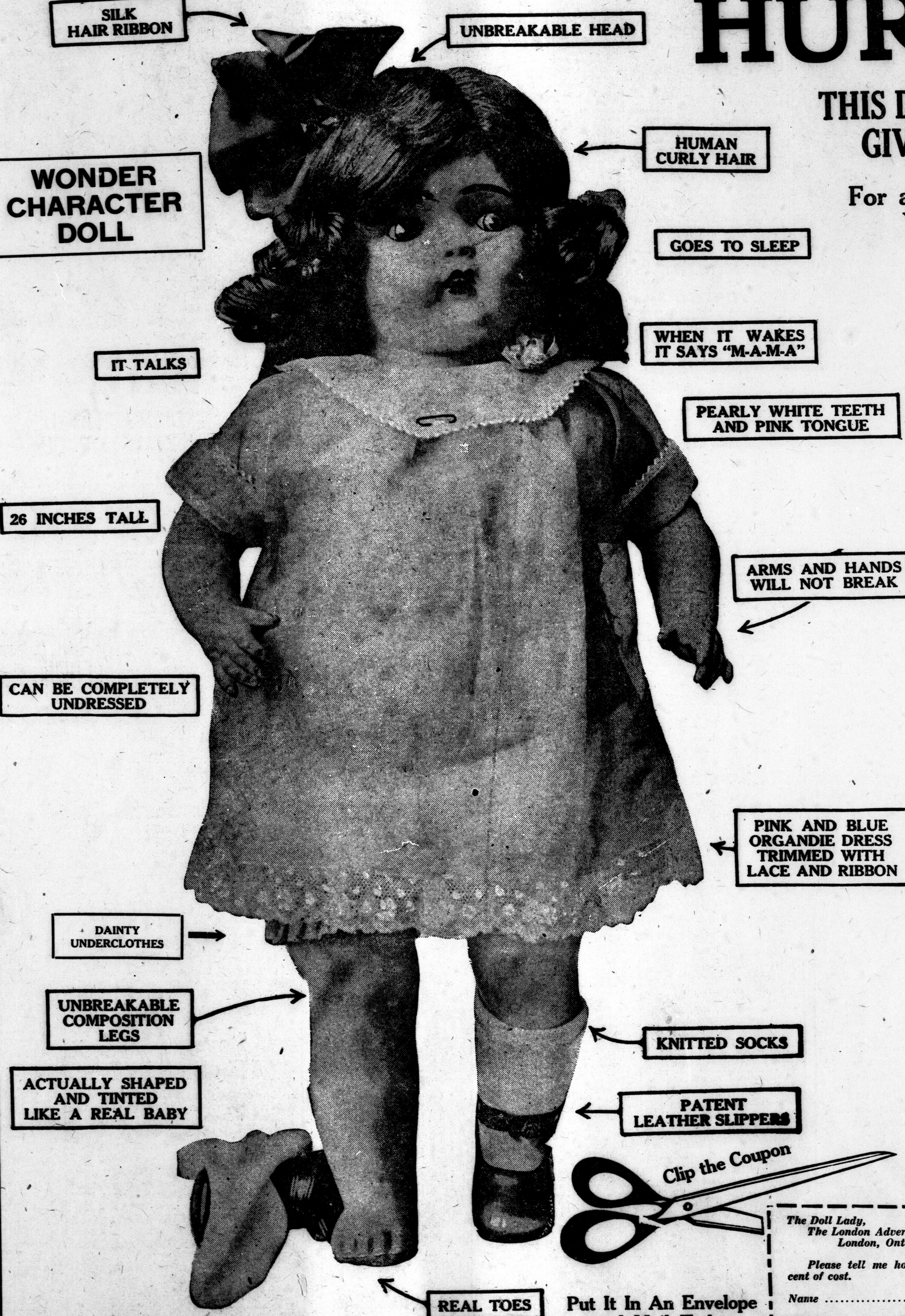
