

In making the golf shot you should always fix an objective. When you are on the tee you should fix a very definite objective somewhere down the fairway. If you are approaching the green, let your objective for the shot be a circle not more than three or four feet in diameter around the This gets the mind somewhat off

the ball, and also gives the mind a positive task to do. It at the same time keeps the mind free from all the "don'ts" which really hinder many golfers. The piano student is taught the location of the keys, as is also the student of the typewriter. The billiard player, sighting his shot, pays attention only to the objective. The marksman measures the line of flight at the objective. You must learn to execute your golf shots in a similar manner. When you do, you similar manner. will get much better results.


