A move has been made to relieve unemployment by the Canadian National Railways sending out instructions to the general managers to re-employ the men laid off in the past six months, according to an official announcement at Toronto last week.

In addition to the work to be undertaken in the shops of the Canadian National Railways, contracts for repair work will be carried on in the car building plants of the various Canadian equipment companies located at Fort William, Hamilton, Montreal, Amherst and New Glasgow. The announcement states will be begun at once.
