



The new law says that no byre is to be allowed within twenty-five feet of any public street or highway, and, as this one stands at the corner touching the limits of both the streets named, the case against it is a very streets named, the case against it is a very clear one. It is not particularly to the credit of the Roman Catholic church author-ities that they allow the splendid and costly building and grounds of the convent to be disfigured by such a nuisance as this. The church of Rome is an artistic and æsthetic church, not in the Occar Wilde or Bunthorne sense of the latter word, however. The beautiful convent building and the
