THE OTTAWA CARNIVAL.

A GOOD DEAL OF TALK ABOUT PRO-VINCIAL RIGHTS.

The ideas sticking up for them—Cape Breton Wants Better Terms—Where is the Danger Question Committee.

OTTAWA, April 4.—After reading the financial minister told the members of the opposition that it was not the intention of the government to remove the 10 per cent differential duty on tea imported from the United States.

Cape Breton is demanding more attention at the hands of the dominion. Mr. Cameron (Ipswich) spoke in support of making an appropriation for building 180 miles of railway on the island.
