Montreal, Jan. 16.—Arthur Allan, the youngest son of the late Sir Hugh Allan, met his death by suffocation at an early hour this morning. He had spent the latter portion of Sunday evening as the St. James' Club with a number of friends, and about 1 o'clock this morning left the club, going home to his room in Dorchester-atreet, only a few yards from the club house.

Some time after the other occupants of the house were awakened by smoke issuing from Mr. Allan's sitting-room. When the door was opened the flames were speedily extinguished and the young man was found sitting in hiseasy chair dead. Investigation showed that he, most likely having fallen asleep, had dropped his glowing cigar in the waste paper basket, and death by suffocation from the smoke had ensued. Mr. Allan had been in poor health for some time, suffering from sore throat.

Arthur Allan was one of the most popular young men in town. He had only attained his majority a few months ago, when by the terms of Sir Hugh Allan's will the Allan estate was divided. Arthur's share wought in a revenue of about \$40,000 a car. The tragic death has created a great mastion in the city on account of the ominence of the family.






