Annual Meeting of the Lambton Farmers' Fire Insurance Co.

The 38th Annual Meeting of the Lamb ton Insurance Company was held in Butler's Hall, in the Village of Wyoming, on Friday the 30th ult. The number present was not large but seemed intensepresent was not large but seemed intense-ly interested in the welfare and success of their Honie Company, and gave evi-dence of their appreciation of the work done during the past year, by giving the Directors and Officers a hearty vote of thanks. Directors Steadman and Smith were missed, the first being absent through illness, the other by pressure of business busine

business. President J. W. Kingston was appoint-ed Chairman of the meeting and W. G. Willoughby Secretary. The Financial Statement and Auditors' Report was read by Mr. McEwen, and the fact that the Company had a cash balance of \$28,000, and only a few small claims unpaid, gave eminent satisfaction. The Directors' Report stated that the Company had now in force 4537 policies, insuring property to the amount of Company had now in force 453/ policies, insuring property to the amount of \$7342386.00. These risks are nearly all in the County of Lambton, as time and again the Board has refused to appoint an agent outside of the County, believing it was not wise to increase the business beyond the observation of the Directors. The losses paid in 1912 amounted to \$9098.72 of the Se claim being accord The losses paid in 1912 amounted to \$9988; 72 of the 88 claims being caused by lightning. Board being of the opin-ion that lightning rods were a great pro-tection, and that Company was being benefitted by their increased use, gave evidence of their faith in them, by re-ducing the rate on properly rodded buildings to 70 cents per \$100 insured. The report also intimated that likely an increased amount would be paid tor ani-mals killed by lightning in the future, which seemed to meet the approval of all present. Mr. D. M. Robertson spoke strongly in favor of the Company taking up wind insurance as well as fire. On motion of Messrs. Grieve and Dewar, the retiring Directors, James Armstrong and Albert E. Minielly were re-elected.
