ed dear to her heart to the last. Since the death of her husband she made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Howden. They removed from Jarvis twelve years ago, living for eight years in Watford. There she did her last active work when in 1917, interested in the work of the I.O.D.E. from June to September she knit 24 pairs of socks for the soldier boys.

Since coming to Waterford, four years ago, the infirmities of age kept her closely at home. Those who knew her well will not soon forget her benignity and sweetness and deeply sympathize with those who mourn

her passing. The funeral service was held on Thursday afternoon. A short service was conducted at the home by the Rev. F. C. Rickard, assisted by the Rev. H. Wilkins. The usual burial service was held at St. Paul's church and cemteery, Jarvis. Ven. Archdeacon Irvine, rector of the parish, assisted by the Rev. J. H. Ross, of Cayuga, conducted this service. The impressive address given by Mr. Ross a former rector of the parish, and the large number present gave kindevidence of dear remembrance of a loving mother now at rest.
